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EXECUTIVE SUMMARY

INTRODUCTION

The California Governor's Office of Emergency Services (Cal OES) presents the annual report of its victim services and public safety grant programs to the Joint Legislative Budget Committee for fiscal year (FY) 2017-18. The following pages illustrate the various activities, funding, and statistical data related to these programs. Although this report is no longer required,ⁱ Cal OES continues to produce it as the report serves to provide the Legislature and our stakeholders with a broad understanding of the work being accomplished across California.

ABSTRACT

This report is a programmatic directory of all victim services and public safety grant programs administered by Cal OES. It lists each program, Grant Subaward, fund source and amount, budget program/component, and the resulting statistics gathered for the prior and current FYs. Please note that the data shown are of the time of the writing of this report, and may not reflect the final outcomes of the programs or projects mentioned.

In FY 2017-18, the time period covered by this report, Cal OES administered approximately \$300 million in state and federal funds to support just over 80 victim services and public safety programs, with nearly 1,200 projects across all of California's 58 counties. These programs respond to victims' needs through direct services to victims and their families to foster healing, or encourage local units of government – sheriff departments, police departments, probation departments and/or crime labs – to engage in prevention, intervention and enforcement efforts to work towards achieving a safer California.

Programs administered by Cal OES continue to evolve and change as needs across California do. Stakeholders are continuously engaged, trainings are provided on a consistent basis to our projects to ensure success, and innovative programs are created that are frequently highlighted as best practice at federal meetings. This report is a summary of these efforts.

PROGRAM HIGHLIGHTS

Children's Unit:

CASA of Orange County, a Subrecipient of the Court Appointed Special Advocate (KS) Program, stated that over the last few years they have had challenges bringing new volunteers to their program. Since receiving funding from the KS Program, they have seen success over the past few months. In fact, the first night of their most recent training class had 56 people in attendance, the highest number they've seen for night one since September 2014.

Criminal Justice Unit:

The Postconviction DNA Testing Assistance (CK) Program had two wrongly convicted individuals freed from prison and three exonerations of individuals listed as sex offenders who were either on parole or had completed their sentence. In September 2018, the movie *Brian Banks* was released detailing the story of Brian Banks and the California Innocence Project, a Subrecipient of the CK Program.

The City of Fairfield Police Department Sexual Assault Unit, a Subrecipient of the Sexual Assault Law Enforcement Specialized Units (ST) Program, was awarded the California Sexual Assault Investigators Association's 2018 Outstanding Agency of the Year Award.

Domestic Violence Unit:

On January 1, 2018, two Programs were expanded and one new program began as follows:

- Cal OES expanded the number of projects under the Domestic Housing First (XD) Program by 32, for a total of 65 projects. The XD Program first provides stable housing, and then supportive services for victims of domestic violence. Cal OES began funding eight projects in 2016, funded an additional 25 in 2017, under the Domestic Violence Housing First (KD) Program, and funded 32 additional projects in January 2018.
- Cal OES expanded the Domestic Violence Assistance (DV) Program by four projects, under the DH Program. The Domestic Violence Assistance Program provides comprehensive support services to domestic violence survivors and their children, including emergency shelter, counseling, court accompaniment, and advocacy.
- The Family Violence Prevention (FX) Program expanedd family and domestic violence prevention efforts in California in two program areas:

- Program Area One Provide financial and technical assistance to local domestic and family violence centers to implement community family violence prevention strategies
- Program Area Two Fund a statewide family violence prevention campaign

Human Trafficking Unit:

The Homeless Youth Emergency Services and Housing (YE) Program began in January 2018 as a one-year program to establish new or expand the capacity for a range of housing options that meet the needs of homeless youth, as well as provide crisis intervention and stabilization services so that immediate needs can be addressed and youth can focus on building skills and a support net to them exit street life and live sustainably. Projects funded under the YE Program must be low barrier-to-entry, use strategies that are trauma informed across program components and operations, be culturally inclusive, and provide for protection against harassment and support positive youth engagement.

Subrecipients of the YE Program were required to develop or expand housing options to meet the needs of homeless youth, including but not limited to: 1) rapid rehousing; 2) rental assistance (to access affordable housing); 3) transitional housing, for a period not to exceed 36 months; and/or 4) supportive housing.

Within the first six months of the YE Program, Subrecipients served 1,138 youth, of whom the vast majority (96.7%) were between the ages of 18-24. Of Transition Age Youth who disclosed their sexual orientation, 60% identified as male, 40% as female, and 27.1% identified as LGBTQ. A total of 131 youth were provided with rapid rehousing, rental assistance, supportive or transitional housing. YE Program-funded projects in the four targeted counties (Los Angeles, San Diego, San Francisco, and Santa Clara) provided youth with 64 drug treatment sessions, 5,431 independent living skills trainings, 100 stabilization planning sessions, and 35 employment trainings.

Sexual Assault Unit:

Several programs have expanded with the increase of Victims of Crime Act (VOCA) funds. The expansion of these programs will continue to create new ways to reach victims of crime and provide them with support through their healing process such as: The Specialized Emergency Housing (KE) Program, Campus Sexual Assault (CT) Program, Victim Advocacy in Detention Facilities (KA) Program, and Victim Service Training (KV) Program. The purpose of the KE Program is to expand emergency shelter and emergency housing assistance resources in California and provide specialized services for victims of crime. Subrecipients identified an unmet need for emergency shelter or emergency housing in their community and proposed an innovative solution. Priority was given to Subrecipients that proposed to serve the following underserved populations: homeless youth, elderly, disabled, and lesbian, gay, bisexual, transgender, and questioning (LGBTQ) victims of crime.

The purpose of the CT Program is to maintain a comprehensive coordinated community response that is victim/survivor centered, enhances victim/survivor safety (regardless of whether or not they report the crime to law enforcement or other investigatory bodies and regardless of whether or not they choose to participate in an investigation), provides confidential services to sexual assault victims/survivors, holds offenders accountable, and includes outreach and prevention activities. This is accomplished by maintaining a Sexual Assault Counselor, per Evidence Code §1035.2, from a local Cal OES Rape Crisis Center Program on the campus, promoting the availability of the services, a joint police/sexual assault Counselor response to reported incidents of sexual assault, and training for police/safety officers, campus investigatory personnel, staff, and faculty.

The purpose of the KA Program is to increase access to appropriate services for victims of sexual assault in detention facilities. The program funds a Sexual Assault Counselor, per Evidence Code §1035.2, to focus solely on serving victims in local detention facilities, and to act as a point of contact for the detention facility to assist in removing any physical or programmatic barriers to service for victims in the detention facility.

The purpose of the expanded KV Program is to allow funding for innovative ideas to meet training needs for victim service providers to develop innovative training on working with victims of cybercrime/identity theft. The target audience must be the victim service providers and/or others who work with cybercrime/identity theft. All cybercrime/identity theft training shall be in person using subject matters experts.

Unserved/Underserved Unit:

Three VOCA-funded programs have expanded to increase services to Underserved Victims of crime: Innovative Response to Marginalized Victims (KI) Program, Elder Abuse (XE) Program, and Native American Tribal Court Advocate (KT) Program. The purpose of the KI Program is to support innovative projects that serve marginalized victims crime. The KI Program focuses on providing direct services to young males of color, victims of gang violence, and refugees. The expansion of the Program incorporates focusing on providing services to low wage workers (janitorial, service industry, etc.), transgender, and foster care youth.

The purpose of the XE Program is to expand the multidisciplinary community response to elder and dependent adult abuse. The Program provides support for communities to improve their ability to identify needs of victims of elder and dependent adult abuse and to improve the delivery of services.

The purpose of the KT Program is to provide funding to Native American tribes, tribal nonprofits/community based organizations, or tribal consortiums operating within a Tribal court system within California. The program promotes justice through establishing Tribal court advocates who are professionally-trained and culturally-centered. Tribal court advocates work within the tribal court system in support of tribal sovereignty in criminal justice matters.

Victim/Witness Unit:

The increase in Victim/Witness funding added much needed resources to the Los Angeles County District Attorney's Office to keep pace with the high demand for victim services. New sites were opened as planned, including the Victim Services K-9 Unit, juvenile court advocacy, homicide specialized advocacy, child abuse specialized advocacy, and additional LA Sheriff's Department station sites. Other new sites are planned as new advocates are hired to fill them and additional budgeted positions are approved.

The new K-9 Unit currently has three facility dogs (Skippy, Nora, and Lennox) who were bred, trained, and socialized by Assistance Dogs of the West. The Victim Services K-9 Unit facility dogs and their Victim Service Representatives (VSRs) assist victims by providing comfort and support to children, elders, victims with disabilities, families of homicide victims, and survivors of sexual assault and domestic violence. Facility dogs have achieved great success in alleviating the fear and discomfort of child victims and other vulnerable victims of crime and play a crucial role in easing stress felt by children in the court system. The K-9 team has been granted access to all Los Angeles Superior court buildings, as well as approval to provide support to victims inside courtrooms for the purpose of accompanying victims to the witness stand during testimony.

The Increased Access to Services (KU) Program enabled the East Los Angeles Women's Center to open their first emergency shelter in the nation serving survivors of sexual assault and domestic violence. Since opening its doors in March 2018, they have served over 100 women and children from a variety of cultures, ages, physical and mental abilities. One in particular was a young female survivor of domestic violence and labor trafficking from Ethiopia. She suffered emotional trauma, PTSD, isolation from her family and culture, physical harm from chemical burns perpetrated by an abusive partner, which disfigured parts of her face, scalp, an ear, and an eye, which lead to chronic physical pain. The agency served this client, considering her barriers as a monolingual survivor, with many limitations and need of medical intervention. The KU Program enabled the agency to support the client with shelter, transportation, crisis intervention and explanation of services and support via an Amharic interpreter, culturally relevant groceries, access to learning English, exercise classes, medical intervention; including assessments by burn specialists for possible surgery and successful referrals made with partner immigration attorneys who are assisting her with proceedings to seek asylum from her perpetrator.

VSPS MAJOR FUND SOURCE DESCRIPTIONS

I. Victims of Crime Act (VOCA) Victim Assistance Formula Grant Program (Formula Grant Program)

The VOCA Formula Grant Program is authorized by the Victims of Crime Act of 1984 (34 U.S.C. § 20103 (a) and (b)).

VOCA authorizes federal financial assistance to states through the VOCA Formula Grant Program for the purpose of supporting eligible crime victim assistance programs that: 1) respond to the emotional and physical needs of victims of crime; 2) help primary and secondary victims of crime to stabilize their lives after a victimization; 3) help victims of crime understand and participate in the criminal justice system; and 4) provide victims of crime with a measure of safety and security. Crime victim is defined as any person who has suffered physical, sexual, financial, or emotional harm as a result of the commission of a crime.

II. Services*Training*Officers* Prosecutors (STOP) Violence Against Women (VAWA) Formula Grant Program

The STOP VAWA Formula Grant Program was authorized in 1994 through the Violence Against Women Act. VAWA, Public Law 103-322 was reauthorized in 2000, 2005 and most recently in 2013. The STOP Formula Grant Program is administered by the Office on Violence Against Women, Office of Justice Programs, U.S. Department of Justice.

The STOP Formula Grant Program promotes the development and the implementation of effective, victim-centered law enforcement, prosecution, and court strategies to address violent crimes against women and the development and enhancement of victim services in cases involving violent crimes against women. States and communities are encouraged to restructure and strengthen the criminal justice system response to domestic violence, sexual assault, and stalking, drawing upon the experience of all participants in the system.

III. The Family Violence Prevention and Services/Domestic Violence Shelter and Supportive Services Grant (FVPSA)

The FVPSA Grant is authorized by 42 U.S.C. § 10401, Family Violence Prevention and Services Act.

The Family Violence Prevention and Services/Domestic Violence Shelter and Supportive Services grant, administered through the Administration on Children, Youth and Families' (ACYF) Family and Youth Services Bureau (FYSB), is designed to assist states in their efforts to support the establishment, maintenance, and expansion of programs and projects to: 1) prevent incidents of family violence, domestic violence, and dating violence; 2) provide immediate shelter, supportive services, and access to community-based programs for victims of family violence, domestic violence, or dating violence, and their dependents; and 3) provide specialized services for children exposed to family violence, domestic violence, or dating violence including victims who are members of underserved populations (45 CFR § 1370.10(a)).

IV. Children's Justice Act Grant (CJA)

The CJA Grant is authorized by Section 107(a) of the Child Abuse Prevention and Treatment Act (P.L. 111-320).

The purpose of the CJA Grant is to assist States in developing, establishing and operating programs designed to improve: (1) the assessment and investigation of suspected child abuse and neglect cases, including cases of suspected child sexual abuse and exploitation, in a manner that limits additional trauma to the child and the child's family; (2) the assessment and investigation of cases of suspected child abuse-related fatalities and suspected child neglect-related fatalities; (3) the investigation and prosecution of cases of child abuse and neglect, including child sexual abuse and exploitation; and (4) the assessment and investigation of cases involving children with disabilities or serious health-related problems who are suspected victims of child abuse or neglect.

V. Sexual Assault Services Formula Program (SASP)-specific to the RC

Program The Sexual Assault Services Formula Program (SASP) is authorized

by 34U.S.C.

§12511. SASP was created by the Violence Against Women and Department of Justice Reauthorization Act of 2005, as amended by the technical amendments to that act, and is the first federal funding stream solely dedicated to the provision of direct intervention and related assistance for victims of sexual assault.

The SASP Formula Program directs grant dollars to states and territories to assist them in supporting rape crisis centers and other nonprofit, nongovernmental organizations or tribal programs that provide core services, direct intervention, and related assistance to victims of sexual assault. Rape crisis centers and other nonprofit and tribal organizations, such as dual programs providing both sexual violence and domestic violence intervention services, play a vital role in assisting sexual assault victims through the healing process, as well as assisting victims through the medical, criminal justice, and social support systems. Funds provided through the SASP Formula Program are designed to supplement other funding sources directed at addressing sexual assault at the state and territorial level.

VI. State General Fund (SGF)

The California State Budget Act authorizes funding, in statute, each fiscal year to specific programs. These programs support services for victims including, but not limited to, housing for homeless youth, legal resources and information, family violence prevention, and training and technical assistance.

VII. State Penalty Fund (SPF)

The State Penalty Fund was created as a depository for assessments on specified fines, penalties, and forfeitures imposed and collected by the courts for criminal offenses and used to support victim services programs, amongst others. These State funds can be used for match requirements following the provisions of the *Subrecipient Handbook*, Section 6522.

CALIFORNIA ADVANCING THE PRISON RAPE ELIMINATION ACT PROGRAM Program/Component: 0385.161

PROGRAM OVERVIEW

The purpose of the California Advancing the Prison Rape Elimination Act (AP) Program is to help bring the California Department of Corrections and Rehabilitation (CDCR) into compliance with the Prison Rape Elimination Act (PREA) standards by establishing victim services for incarcerated survivors of sexual abuse. Just Detention International (JDI) works with the California Coalition Against Sexual Assault (CALCASA) and CDCR to secure formal partnerships between all CDCR facilities and their local rape crisis centers. JDI continues to build upon these partnerships as well as work with CALCASA to extend the Program to youth fire camps and youth detention facilities and to vulnerable populations such as lesbian, gay, bisexual, transgender, and questioning (LGBTQ) survivors, survivors with mental illness, and those with physical disabilities.

The Program partners will provide training and resources to prison officials and rape crisis counselors, establishing basic emergency services for inmates who report sexual abuse. JDI has established pilot, facility-based, multi-disciplinary teams in two CDCR prisons who will take the lead in responding to, investigating, and monitoring reports of sexual abuse. As the Program continues to grow, JDI is also working on providing outreach and education to Sexual Assault Forensic Examiners regarding the basics of prisoner rape and the PREA Program; furthermore, JDI has expanded its efforts to prevent and respond to sexual abuse within the California Institute for Women, aiming to reestablish commitment toward addressing the chronic violence within this prison.

The Grant Subaward performance period is May 1, 2017, through April 30, 2019. This program was extended from the previous year.

The AP Program is currently supported with funds through the federal Services*Training*Officers*Prosecutors (STOP) Violence Against Women (VAWA) Formula Grant Program.

The multidisciplinary team includes medical professionals, law enforcement, mental health, prosecution, child protective services, and victim advocacy.

The purpose of the Child Advocacy Center (KC) Program is to fund emerging, affiliate, and accredited CACs so they can implement and/or enhance their direct services, including therapy, courtroom preparation, victim advocacy, and case management.

National Children's Alliance (NCA) is the national association and accrediting body for CACs. The KC Program provides funding to CACs so they can achieve NCA accreditation if not accredited, and enhance their services if they are already accredited.

PROGRAM OVERVIEW

Court Appointed Special Advocates (CASAs) are trained community volunteers appointed by juvenile court judges to advocate for children who have been placed into the protective custody of the child welfare system due to abuse or neglect. The CASA volunteer reviews all court facts and all court documents pertaining to the child's case and submits formal reports to the Judge at every scheduled hearing/review. The CASA volunteer monitors the child's case to assure that the judicial and child welfare systems are moving ahead to secure a safe, permanent home for the child, and that courtordered services are provided to the child.

The purpose of the Court Appointed Special Advocate (KS) Program is to fund CASA programs in each county so they can effectively recruit, train, and supervise CASA volunteers in order to provide more children with advocacy services.

The KS Program is supported with federal Victims of Crime Act (VOCA) Victim Assistance Formula Grant Program funds.

The Homeless Youth and Exploitation (HX) Program is a comprehensive program developed pursuant to the 1986 Welfare and Institutions Code §13703 and California Penal Code §13837 to assist homeless youth in exiting street life and to provide specialized services to youth involved in sexually exploitive activities.

"Homeless youth" refers to youth under the age of 24 who are homeless or at risk of becoming homeless, no longer eligible for foster care on the basis of age, or have run away from home; or are under the age of 18 and have emancipated and are homeless or at risk of becoming homeless. "Sexually exploited youth" refers to youth who are under the age of 18 and exchange sexual favors for money, shelter, clothing, and/or other goods/services. Also included in this criterion are youth involved in commercial exploitation such as stripping or pornography.

Services provided by the HX Program include: in-person counseling; group counseling/discussions; temporary safe shelter; training on independent living and survival skills; and access/referrals to other services as appropriate. These services may be provided through the Subrecipient agency or in collaboration with partnering agencies. Operational Agreements must be maintained with agencies partnering in providing HX Program services, and with the following supportive agencies: referral entities such as California Coalition for Youth (24/7 youth crisis and intervention hotline); California Workforce Investment Board's state or local youth council; local law enforcement agencies; social service agencies; mental health, medical and dental treatment agencies; and a local victim/witness assistance center. Additional assistance to be provided includes basic health care, long-term stabilization planning, and follow-up services, and outreach to educate the public on issues and dangers faced by homeless youth nationwide.

The HX Program is funded through the Victims of Crime Act (VOCA), State General Funds (SGF), and State Penalty Funds (SPF) for fiscal years (FY) 2017-18 and 2018-19.

PROGRAM OVERVIEW

The Homeless Youth Emergency Services Pilot (HY) Program expands crisis intervention and stabilization services to homeless minors and transition age youth to address and resolve immediate crises these youth face and assist them in focusing on their futures. The HY Program was awarded in FY 2016-17 and provided \$10,000,000 of Emergency Housing & Assistance Funds (EHAF) over five years to four Subrecipients.

"Homeless youth" refers to youth under the age of 24 who are homeless or at risk of becoming homeless, no longer eligible for foster care on the basis of age, or have run away from home; or are under the age of 18 and have emancipated and are homeless or at risk of becoming homeless.

Subrecipients must have a goal of ensuring the congruency of services, consistency of care, and a reduction in duplication of services, and must demonstrate the ability to proactively collaborate with other service providers serving the needs of the homeless in the Subrecipient's service area.

Subrecipients of the HY Program must provide the following services as required by California Welfare and Institutes Code, Section 13701:

- Food/meals and access to shelter
- Counseling to address the immediate emotional crisis or problem
- Outreach services such as drop-in facilities
- Screening and providing for basic health care needs
- Referrals to other services offered by public and private agencies, such as employment services, law enforcement agencies, social services, schools, mental health and healthcare providers, and local victim/witness assistance centers
- Long-term stabilization planning, and follow-up services, to ensure that family reunification or placement outside the family is stable

PROGRAM OVERVIEW

The Human Trafficking Victim Assistance (HV) Program purpose is to aid victims of sex and/or labor trafficking in recovering from the trauma they experience and to facilitate their reintegration into society. Subrecipients must provide comprehensive safety/supportive services, including a 24-hour crisis hotline, emergency shelter, temporary housing, emergency food/clothing, counseling, transportation, legal assistance, and referrals to existing local resources.

According to the HV Program requirements, Subrecipients must secure and sustain operational agreements (OAs) with other agencies in the Subrecipient's service area. The purpose of these OAs is to increase synergetic efforts with local law enforcement, District Attorney Offices, Victim/Witness Assistance Programs, domestic violence and sexual assault providers, community-based organizations who work with human trafficking victims, and existing Cal OES-funded victim assistance providers.

The HV projects must employ at least one staff member working with human trafficking victims, who qualifies as a Human Trafficking Caseworker pursuant to Evidence Code 1038.2, and will be trained accordingly. The initial cohort of 11 projects was funded at a total of \$10,000,000 for a 2-year performance period, and later amended to a total of \$15,000,000 for a 39-month period. During 2017, a second cohort of 10 Applicants was funded at a total of \$10,000,000 for a \$10,000,000 for a \$10,000 for \$10,000

JOHN R. JUSTICE GRANT PROGRAM

PROGRAM OVERVIEW

The California Governor's Office of Emergency Services (Cal OES) is the designated State Administering Agency for the John R. Justice (JRJ) Student Loan Repayment Program grant, administered by the U.S. Department of Justice, Bureau of Justice Assistance.

Student loan debt is consistently cited as the overwhelming reason why attorneys decline or leave positions as prosecutors and public defenders, which has created challenges for the public sector to hire and retain capable attorneys. Acknowledging these challenges, the JRJ Program was codified at 2 U.S.C. §3797cc-21, and named for the late John Reid Justice of South Carolina, to encourage qualified attorneys to choose careers as prosecutors and public defenders and to continue in that service.

The JRJ Program provides loan repayment assistance for local, state, and federal public defenders and local and state prosecutors who commit to continued employment as public defenders and prosecutors. An attorney must not be in default on repayment of any federal student loans. State agencies administering the JRJ Program must ensure that funding for local repayment is allocated equally between prosecutors and public defenders.

Cal OES grants loan repayment disbursements to beneficiaries, equally split between public defenders and prosecutors. The disbursements are paid directly to the beneficiaries' loan servicer. Cal OES has partnered with the California Student Aid Commission (CSAC) to administer the JRJ Program.

In FY 2017, California received \$112,447 for administering the grant and loan forgiveness. Cal OES provided loan repayment disbursements to continuing, or newly admitted, public defenders and prosecutors beneficiaries in the amount of \$732 each.

In FY 2018, California received \$114,686 of funds to administer. Per California Penal Code §13823.93, the Medical Training Center (EM) Program funds one Subrecipient to provide training for forensic medical examiners in cases of sexual assault, child sexual abuse, domestic violence, elder/dependent adult abuse, and child physical abuse/neglect. PROGRAM OVERVIEW

The purpose of the Sexual Assault Response Team (XS) Program is to enable Cal OES-funded Rape Crisis Program advocates to participate in the planning and

coordinating of Sexual Assault Response Team (SART) efforts in their local community with the goal of improving the quality of response to and services for sexual assault victims. This may be accomplished by creating/recreating a SART in their community or enhancing the existing SART and having one SART Advocate as the point of contact to assist a victim through the entirety of the criminal justice process.

SARTs are coalitions of agencies that serve sexual assault victims. Core membership for a SART typically includes victim advocates, law enforcement officers, forensic medical examiners, forensic scientists, and prosecutors. Multidisciplinary SARTs work together to formalize interagency guidelines that prioritize victims' needs, hold offenders accountable, and promote public safety. SART models range from informal, cooperative partnerships to more formalized, coordinated, and multidisciplinary responses on local, regional, state, tribal, or territory levels. In general, SARTs are committed to victims' rights and needs, organize their service delivery to enhance evidence collection, and educate the community about services available for the intervention and prevention of sexual assault. Many communities in California have robust SARTs with broad agency participation and a commitment to providing traumainformed care to sexual assault victims. Other communities are less invested in a multidisciplinary response to victims of sexual assault.

The XS Program performance period is from July 1, 2016, to December 31, 2019. The Program is currently supported with funds through the federal Victims of Crime Act (VOCA) Victim Assistance Formula Grant Program.

The Transitional Housing (XH) Program was developed to create, and/or enhance, transitional housing for crime victims, including transitional housing, short-term housing assistance, and supportive services that allow victims to move into permanent housing via a path that best fits their needs. Subrecipients were allowed to select the victim population they would serve through the XH Program. Thirty-eight projects, including seven that are specifically serving youth and transitional age youth victims of crime, are providing safe housing and supportive services to victims of crimes such as domestic violence, human trafficking, and child or elder abuse.

In addition to transitional housing and rental assistance, Subrecipients provide follow-up services such as advocacy, support groups, case management, and minimal financial assistance. The XH projects must address the barriers experienced by crime victims when accessing transitional housing and support services. Additional supportive services include locating/securing permanent housing, securing employment, legal assistance, transportation, counseling, childcare services, and case management.

While supportive services are available to clients, clients are not required to participate to be assisted by the XH Program.

Projects must collaborate with one or more organizations, to expand the scope of services in order to promote clients' self-sufficiency and economic independence, assisting with housing/homelessness, and providing job training, legal services, and other services to underserved populations. Late in 2017, Subrecipients received additional funding, and the subaward end date was extended to December 31, 2019.

In fiscal year 2018-19, additional funds were made available for an expansion of the XH Program; Cal OES is currently in the process of awarding these funds through a competitive process.

PROGRAM OVERVIEW

The Tribal Trauma-Informed Training (TI) Program establishes and administers comprehensive, culturally relevant training to service providers who assist Native American victims of crime. The TI training addresses the historical trauma of genocide, loss of culture, forcible removal of family and community of Native Americans; resulting in a host of cumulative spiritual, emotional, physical and social ills including victimization and self-harm. The desired outcome is to increase the knowledge and strengthen the skills of service providers, to address victim service needs while respecting Native American cultural practices and beliefs.

The TI Program must form a Curriculum Advisory Committee of subject matter experts (SME) to guide the curriculum development. The SME must include, but is not limited to: Tribal Council, Tribal Law Enforcement, Tribal First Responders, Tribal Advocates, Tribal Social Service Providers, Cal OES Unserved/Underserved Victims Unit, Domestic Violence Service Providers, Sexual Assault Service Providers, and Victim/Witness Service Providers. The curriculum consists of six modules: Trauma, Native American History, Trauma Informed, Tribal Law Enforcement and First Responders, Healing, and Vicarious Trauma.

The TI Program trauma-informed curriculum must include, but is not limited to:

- Identification of the unique needs of victims in Native American Communities and best practices in service delivery.
- Role of tribal first responders and their responsibilities.
- Trauma-Informed Care/Historical Trauma.
- Identification and utilization of available tribal law enforcement resources.
- Identification and utilization of available tribal victim resources.

The TI Program must conduct a Training of Trainers (TOT) to provide consistent statewide trainings and provide regional TI trainings to Native American Communities, local service providers, tribal service providers; tribal law enforcement and tribal governments.

The TI Program is supported with federal Victims of Crime Act (VOCA) Victim Assistance Formula Grant Program funding through the one-time Victim Assistance Discretionary Grant (VADG) Training Program for VOCA Victim Assistance Grantees.

VICTIM ADVOCACY IN DETENTION FACILITIES PROGRAM Program/Component: 0385.451

PROGRAM OVERVIEW

The purpose of the Victim Advocacy in Detention Facilities (KA) Program is to increase access to appropriate services for victims of sexual assault in detention facilities. The Program funds a Sexual Assault Counselor, per Evidence Code §1035.2, to focus solely on serving victims in local detention facilities, and to act as the facility point of contact to assist in removing any physical or programmatic barriers to service for victims in the detention facility.

PROGRAM OVERVIEW

The Victim Information and Notification Everyday (VN) Program protects victims of crime from perpetrators by tracking the status of offenders while incarcerated and/or immediately upon release. VN supports the National Victim Notification Network service that allows crime victims to anonymously access timely and reliable information about criminal cases and the custody status of offenders 24 hours a day. Victims and other concerned citizens can register by phone, email, text message, or TTY device to be notified whenever an offender's custody status changes. The system communicates with jail and prison booking systems in near real-time, by transmitting updated information to the Appriss Data Network, which manages the automated interfaces and monitors offender status. When a change in the custody status of an offender occurs, county jails and state prison facilities transmit information through Appriss, which then immediately notifies registered crime victims of the offender's new status.

The VN Program is supported with State Penalty Funds (SPF) and federal Victims of Crime Act (VOCA) Victim Assistance Formula Grant Program funds.

The Victim Legal Assistance (KL) Program, which began on October 1, 2017, is intended to increase the availability of holistic civil and criminal legal assistance needed to effectively aid adult and youth victims of crime who are seeking relief in legal matters relating to that crime at no cost to the victim. It was created in response to the success of our Victim Legal Assistance XL Program initiated during the prior year. KL Program funding may not be used to provide criminal defense services. The objective of the KL Program is to develop and/or advance collaborative projects that provide quality legal representation to victims of crime.

The KL Program components include funding for community-based organizations to provide direct services to victims to be used to develop/or enhance cooperative efforts with legal assistance providers to supply holistic legal assistance to victims of crime.

The KL Program affords services to all victims of crime regardless of ethnicity, beliefs, or orientation, including family law matters such as divorce, custody and visitation.

Assistance with immigration legal matters, T and U visas, restraining orders, employment and tenant rights, and credit repair are also funded by the KL Program.

Cal OES has determined that the following research projects, tort cases, criminal defense of victims charged with crimes, law reform initiatives, including but not limited to litigation, child sexual abuse and child protection system service, or general trainings to agencies that are not formal/informal KL project partners are out of the program scope and not supported by KL funding.

In State fiscal year 2018-19, additional federal Victims of Crime Act (VOCA) FFY17 funds in the amount of \$3,000,000 were made available for an expansion of the KL Program; Cal OES is currently in the process of awarding these funds through a competitive Request for Proposal.

PROGRAM OVERVIEW

The Victims' Legal Resource Center (VR) Program was established by the California State Legislature through passage of Assembly Bill 1176 (Chapter 1443, Statutes of 1985 and codified as California Penal Code Section 13897.1). The VR Program Victim Legal Resource Center (VLRC) has been providing victim service centers with information regarding legal rights of crime victims since 1984. The VLRC, located at the University of the Pacific, McGeorge School of Law in Sacramento, is the only organization in California that provides victims of crime statewide with information about their legal rights in the criminal and civil justice systems. The VLRC helps victims of all crimes, in all counties, in any language without any qualifying criteria, to understand their rights, find resources, and feel empowered.

The VLRC operates the 1-800-VICTIMS toll-free hotline number, as well as a website and mobile app to provide information and referral services to crime victims. The VLRC also conducts outreach presentations at community events, and provides printed outreach materials, to educate the public about the services available through the VLRC. In order to provide exceptional service to victims of crime and service providers, paid staff, interns, and volunteers receive extensive training, supervised by a subject matter expert with many years of qualifying experience.

The VR Program is supported with federal Victims of Crime Act (VOCA) Victim Assistance Formula Grant Program funds and State General Funds (SGF).

Program staff are required to maintain a reduced caseload in order to concentrate prosecutorial efforts and resources on individuals who are charged with crimes of domestic violence, dating violence, sexual assault, and /or stalking. Vertical prosecution is shown to improve conviction rates, reduce victim trauma, and provide more consistent and appropriate sentencing.

VOCA TRAINING PROGRAM Program/Component: 0385.916

PROGRAM OVERVIEW

The Victim Assistance Discretionary Grant Training (VG) Program is a program funded by the Victims of Crime Act (VOCA) Victim Assistance Program, for the purpose of creating training programs focusing on one of four categories (identified below). All four projects are to include in-person training, followed up by the development of one webinar to be saved for accessibility to Subrecipients of VOCA Victim Assistance Formula Grant Program funds, and service providers who work with victims of crime. Technical assistance must be provided following each training.

Cultural Awareness

Trainings must focus on five marginalized communities and address intersectionality of those types of communities and the development and implementation of language access plans. The trainings are provided by a multidisciplinary group of trainers, which represent the identified communities. The target audience is victim service and social service providers.

Human Trafficking

Training is to be curriculum-based and focused on identifying and responding to the needs of human trafficking victims. The training addresses the dynamics of labor and sex trafficking, and the unique needs of sexually exploited children and transitional-aged youth. The target audience is victim service providers and first responders, and the trainers are victim service providers and law enforcement.

Trauma-Informed Care

This project provides training and technical assistance to Cal OES-funded victim service programs and victim service providers implementing trauma-informed care. It is provided by victim service providers experienced in trauma-informed care of crime victims.

Additional Victim Service Training Need

This project provides funding for innovative ideas and needs not identified by Cal OES and the VOCA Steering Committee. The target audience is victim service providers and/or others who work with crime victims. The trainers and course topics for this Program are to be determined by the Subrecipient.

The Youth Emergency Telephone Referral Network (YT) Program, authorized by Assembly Bill 3075 (Chacon, Chapter 1614, Statutes of 1984), connects youth in need of services with appropriate service providers. California Coalition for Youth (CCY), the YT Program Subrecipient, operates the California Youth Crisis Line (CYCL), a nonthreatening, toll-free telephone hotline (1-800-843-5200) which can be accessed by runaway and homeless youth seeking assistance anywhere in the State. CYCL counselors provide crisis counseling to callers, and/or referrals connecting youth with available local resources essential to their well-being, such as food, shelter, counseling, outreach, medical services, and/or transportation.
