

Daily Focus- Disaster Declaration

Major Disaster Declaration Number FEMA 4558-DR (for California Wildfires - August 14, 2020 to September 26, 2020) has been amended to include Lassen and Tulare Counties for Individual Assistance and Public Assistance, including direct federal assistance.

COVID-19 at a Glance



California's [positivity rate](#) is a key indicator of community spread. **The 7-day positivity rate is 2.6% and the 14-day positivity rate is 2.6%.** For skilled nursing facility data, visit: [Skilled Nursing Facilities: COVID-19](#).



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As of October 14, local health departments have reported 41,753 confirmed positive cases in health care workers and 194 deaths statewide. Each week, CDPH updates the number of cases of Multisystem Inflammatory Syndrome in Children (MIS-C) reported in the state. As of October 13, 111 cases of MIS-C have been reported statewide. To protect patient confidentiality counties with fewer than 11 cases, we are not providing total counts at this time.

*Parents should be aware of the signs and symptoms of MIS-C including fever that does not go away, abdominal pain, vomiting, diarrhea, neck pain, rash, bloodshot eyes or feeling tired. Contact your child's doctor immediately if your child has these symptoms. Early diagnosis and treatment of patients is critical to preventing long-term complications.

Racial Demographics – A More Complete Picture

- Health outcomes are affected by forces including structural racism, poverty and the disproportionate prevalence of underlying conditions such as asthma and heart disease among Latinos and Black Californians.
- Overall, for adults 18 and older, Latinos and African Americans are dying at disproportionately higher levels. The proportion of COVID-19 deaths in Latinos and African Americans is more than 1.3 times their population representation across all adult age categories.
- Latinos, African Americans, Native Hawaiians and Pacific Islanders are dying at disproportionately higher levels. More males are dying from COVID-19 than females, in line with national trends. More information is available at [COVID-19 Race and Ethnicity Data](#)

- If you are impacted by the on-going wildfires in Butte, Lake, Monterey, Napa, San Mateo, San Diego, Santa Cruz, Solano, Sonoma, and Yolo counties, you may be eligible for assistance from the FEMA.
- Grants may help eligible survivors with financial assistance that includes rent, home repair, home replacement and other disaster-related needs such as childcare, medical and dental expenses.
- Do not wait to register at www.disasterassistance.gov.
- People who suffered losses from the fires should contact their insurance companies first. Insurance delivers the majority of financial help in disasters. For losses not covered by insurance, people can register for



disaster assistance in three ways: online through disasterassistance.gov, by using the FEMA App or by calling 800-621-3362.

Disaster Unemployment Assistance Benefits

If you live in one of the counties listed below and you have been impacted by the wildfires that started in August, the deadline for filing for Disaster Unemployment Assistance (DUA) benefits has been extended to November 30, 2020.

*Individuals from these counties are now eligible to apply for these DUA benefits if their loss of work or self-employment was a direct result of the fires, and they do not qualify for regular state unemployment insurance, Pandemic Emergency Unemployment Compensation, FED-ED extensions, or Pandemic Unemployment Assistance benefits

Specifically, the DUA benefits are available to workers, business owners, and self-employed individuals who lost their jobs or business, or had their work hours reduced due to the ongoing wildfires.

These benefits apply to losses beginning the week of August 16, 2020, and individuals can receive up to \$450 a week in benefits for a maximum period of 27 weeks.

Local Assistance Centers

- In the ongoing response and recovery mission to support wildfire survivors impacted by the August 2020 fire siege across California, the California Governor's Office of Emergency Services (Cal OES) in joint support from local, state and federal agencies are announcing multiple Local Assistance Centers (LAC) opening to wildfire survivors.

- Due to recent 30-day extension granted by FEMA, the program will now continue through November 8th.
- Food provider meals must meet the following nutritional requirements:
 - Breakfast: low in sodium, no sugary drinks (<24 grams /8 oz. and of fruit juice, must be only 100 percent fruit juice allowed.)
 - Lunch and dinner: a piece of fresh fruit or vegetable on each dish, and low in sodium, no sugary drinks (<24 grams /8 oz. and of fruit juice, must be only 100 percent fruit juice allowed.

Contact Tracing

To develop contact tracing capabilities, the State has:

- Developed a data management platform in collaboration with our county partners and has offered the tool free-of-charge to all local public health departments;
- Developed a virtual training academy in partnership with academic partnership, including UCSF and UCLA, to scale our training capabilities across all counties free-of-charge;
- Redirected 3,600 state staff to augment the local contact tracing workforce of over 7,000 staff; and
- Developed a public awareness campaign, California Connected, in partnership with philanthropy to educate the public on the importance of contact tracing.

CALCONNECT DATA SYSTEM

The data management platform (CalCONNECT) went live with basic functionality as a pilot with one local health department on May 13. In the subsequent 10 weeks, 39 additional local health departments (LHD) have been added to CalCONNECT. As a result of not having all LHDs fully on the system yet, the system does not capture data for all contact tracing that is occurring in each jurisdiction or in California.

TRAINING FOR STATE AND LOCAL STAFF

In partnership with UCSF and UCLA, the state implemented the Virtual Training Academy to support the training of state and local staff to become case investigators and contact tracers. More than 7500 state and local staff have participated to date in the State's UC VTA training for contact tracing or case investigation.

LHDs may choose to send their staff through the VTA or may pursue other options for training their staff. In addition, LHDs had seasoned staff that did not need to go through new training for COVID19 contact tracing.



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DEPLOYMENT OF STATE WORKFORCE

At the inception of this program, the state offered to redirect state staff as contact tracers free-of-charge to local health departments. With the surge of new cases, local health departments are now in need of case investigators and so we are adjusting our program to train state staff to help to fill that gap for this more advanced role. To date, we have deployed more than 1300 state staff to 20 local health departments and we continue to deploy more staff each week.



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- All data and tier assignments are based on results from week ending October 3, 2020. See how tiers are assigned and change, as well as county historical data ([California Blueprint Data Chart](#)) at the [California Department of Public Health guidance page](#).
- Every county in California is assigned to a tier based on its test positivity and adjusted case rate. At a minimum, counties must remain in a tier for at least 3 weeks before moving forward.
- Data is reviewed weekly and tiers are updated on Tuesdays. To move forward, a county must meet the next tier's criteria for two consecutive weeks. If a county's metrics worsen for two consecutive weeks, it will be assigned a more restrictive tier.
- What happened to the County monitoring List?
 - The previous July 13th order was replaced with a [new order](#).
 - On October 6, California counties can further enhance their effort to combat COVID-19 with the use of the [Health Equity Metric](#), which is a part of the state's [Blueprint for a Safer Economy](#). This equity metric is designed to help counties reduce, prevent and mitigate the spread of COVID-19 among Californians who have been disproportionately impacted by this pandemic.



Actions Taken by the State and Federal Government

- **October 9** California Department of Public Health released updated guidance for private gatherings, which are events that bring together people from different households at the same time in a single space or location. All private gatherings must be held outside and are restricted to no more than three separate households at one time.

- **September 28** Governor Newsom issued an emergency proclamation for the counties of Napa, Sonoma and Shasta due to the Glass and Zogg fires.

The Governor also sent a letter to the President requesting a Presidential Major Disaster Declaration to assist state and local wildfire response and recovery efforts in the counties of Fresno, Los Angeles, Madera, Mendocino, San Bernardino, San Diego and Siskiyou.

Additionally, Nevada and Santa Clara counties have been added the August Presidential Major Disaster Declaration. Both counties are eligible for public assistance, including direct federal assistance. Santa Clara county is eligible for Individual Assistance.

- **September 25** Governor Newsom today issued an emergency proclamation for the counties of Del Norte, Los Angeles and Mendocino to bolster the response to various fires which have burned thousands of acres, destroyed homes and caused the evacuation of residents.

The Governor also signed an executive order to streamline recovery efforts in communities across the state impacted by devastating fires. The order extends the state's prohibition on price gouging in impacted counties through March 25, 2021; extends the deadline for impacted residents to file a claim for property tax postponement; and directs the Franchise Tax Board, Board of Equalization, Department of Tax and Fee Administration and the Office of Tax Appeals to provide extensions to impacted residents and businesses for filing, audits, billing, notices and assessments, among other provisions.

- **September 23** Governor Newsom signed an executive order to extend authorization for local governments to halt evictions for commercial renters



impacted by the COVID-19 pandemic through March 31, 2021, and address a variety of issues in response to the pandemic.

- **September 17** Governor Newsom [signed](#) legislation to protect California's workforce amid the COVID-19 Pandemic.
- **September 10** Governor Newsom [declared](#) State of Emergency in Siskiyou County Due to Fires.
- **September 9** Governor Newsom [signed](#) bills to support small businesses grappling with the impacts of the COVID-19 Pandemic, in order to bolster economic **recovery**.
- **September 8** Governor Newsom [unveiled a partnership](#) with Sesame Workshop for Back-to-School PSAs on how kids can stay safe during COVID-19. A PSA with Elmo and his dad are available in English and Spanish.
- **September 6** Governor Gavin Newsom [declared a State of Emergency](#) in Fresno, Madera, Mariposa, San Bernardino, and San Diego Counties due to fire.
- **September 3** Governor Gavin Newsom [signed](#) an [executive order](#) extending consumer protections against price gouging through March 4, 2021 as California continues to respond to the COVID-19 pandemic. The Governor also [signed](#) an [emergency proclamation](#) to free up additional energy capacity amid extreme temperatures across California.
- **September 2** Governor Newsom [Announced](#) Housing Is Key Campaign to Inform Californians About State's New Tenant and Landlord Protections. Under new law, no tenant can be evicted before February 1, 2021 as a result of rent owed due to a COVID-19 related hardship.



How People Can Protect Themselves:

We are all in this together. We are working rapidly to keep our state healthy. Every person has a role to play. Your actions save lives.

DO:

- Stay home
- Avoid people outside your household
- Wash hands with soap and water for at least 20 seconds
- Wearing a cloth face mask when out in public
- Cover your cough or sneeze
- Frequently clean and disinfect touched objects and surfaces
- Maintain physical distance of six feet whenever outside of the house

DON'T

- Leave the house except for essential activities
- Shake hands
- Touch your face
- Go to the doctor if you are not sick
- Stockpile masks or gloves
- It is also important that anyone experiencing symptoms of COVID-19, call their health care provider first before seeking medical care so that appropriate precautions can be taken.
- Stay away from work, school or other people if you become sick with respiratory symptoms like fever and cough.

About the Tests:

- **There have been 16,517,812 tests conducted in California. This represents an increase of 92,325 over the prior 24-hour reporting period.** These numbers include data from commercial, private and academic labs, including Quest, LabCorp, Kaiser, University of California and Stanford, and the 25 [state and county health labs](#) currently testing. You can find a [testing site](#) in your area on the main CA COVID-19 website: covid19.ca.gov.
- CDPH has posted a new dashboard reporting how long California patients are waiting for COVID-19 test results. California has worked to reduce testing turnaround times in recent weeks to help curb the spread of the virus. During the week of September 27 to October 3, the average time patients waited for test results was 1.2 days. During this same time period, 69 percent of patients received test results in 1 day and 92 percent received them within two days. The testing turnaround time dashboard is updated weekly.
- The California Department of Public Health released [updated testing guidance on July 14](#) that focuses on testing hospitalized individuals with signs or symptoms of COVID-19 and people being tested as part of the investigation and management of outbreaks, including contact tracing. The testing guidance also prioritizes individuals who have COVID-19



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symptoms and individuals without symptoms who fall into high risk categories.

- The California Department of Public Health launched an interactive website to help Californians quickly search [testing sites by location](#) and schedule an appointment. The testing locator website features community testing locations which are open to Californians who meet current testing guidelines.

- [California Small Business Loan Guarantee Program](#) (via IBank) is making available \$50 million in state funding, providing potential capital for individuals who do not qualify for federal funds.
 - Small Businesses located in California with 1-750 employees that have been negatively impacted or experienced disruption by COVID-19 and nonprofits are eligible.
- U.S. Small Business Administration (SBA) has declared all [California counties](#) eligible for the Economic Injury Disasters Loans.
- U.S. Small Business announced that agricultural businesses are now eligible for SBA's Economic Injury Disaster Loan (EIDL) and EIDL Advance programs.
- This SBA declaration makes Economic Injury Disaster Loans available to impacted small businesses, small agricultural cooperatives, small businesses engaged in aquaculture, and private non-profit organizations.



- SBA loans can be approved up to \$2 million but are limited to the economic injury determined by SBA. These loans are intended to assist through the disaster recovery period.
 - In response to the COVID-19 pandemic, small business owners in all U.S. states, Washington D.C., and territories are eligible to apply for an Economic Injury Disaster Loan advance of up to \$10,000. This advance will provide economic relief to businesses that are currently experiencing a temporary loss of revenue. Funds will be made available within three days of a successful application. This loan advance will not have to be repaid.
 - This advance may be available even if your EIDL application was declined or is still pending and will be forgiven. If you wish to apply for the Advance on your EIDL, please visit <https://covid19relief.sba.gov/#/> as soon as possible to fill out a new, streamlined application.
- U.S. Small Business Administration announced changes to help borrowers still paying back SBA loans from previous disasters. By making this change, deferments through December 31, 2020, will be automatic. Now, borrowers of home and business disaster loans do not have to contact SBA to request deferment.
