Expanding Access Through Innovation: The Updated Disaster Response Interpreter Program

The California Governor's Office of Emergency Services (Cal OES) and its Office of Access and Functional Needs (OAFN) launched the first delivery of the newly updated Disaster Response Interpreter (DRI) Program curriculum. This innovative credentialing program combines online coursework with in-person instruction to create a truly hybrid learning experience that is both flexible and effective for American Sign Language (ASL) interpreters across California.

Developed in partnership with NorCal Services for the Deaf and Hard of Hearing, the updated DRI Program integrates digital learning modules with hands-on workshops designed to build real-world readiness. The first hybrid session was hosted at the Greater Los Angeles Agency on Deafness (GLAD).

A total of 25 experienced American Sign Language (ASL) interpreters participated, bringing expertise from community, medical, and emergency response settings. Feedback was overwhelmingly positive, with participants praising the engaging hybrid format, practical exercises, and strong sense of collaboration throughout the course.

To participate in the DRI Program, interpreters must meet the following criteria:

- Certification: NAD Level 3–5; RID CDI, CI/CT, IC/TC, CSC, MCSC, SC:L; NIC Generalist, Advanced, or Master Level; or be a Qualified Deaf Interpreter with attestation from a California Deaf Access Program partner agency.
- Experience: Minimum of five years (ten preferred) of interpreting experience in community, medical, law enforcement, mental health, or emergency settings.

- Availability: Flexibility and willingness to respond during emergency or disaster events.
- Background Check: Ability to pass a Department of Justice background check.
- Affiliation: Employment or contract with a DRI Partner Deaf Access Program agency.

By modernizing the DRI Program, Cal OES and OAFN are strengthening California's capacity to ensure accessible, reliable communication during disasters. This renewed focus on training excellence and collaboration with the deaf and interpreting communities reflects our shared commitment to building a more inclusive and resilient emergency management system for all Californians.

Whether you're at work, school, or home – Join millions of Californians statewide on Thursday, October 16th at 10:16am for the Great California ShakeOut drill.


