### **LAW ENFORCEMENT SPECIALIZED UNITS (LE) PROGRAM**

This Request for Proposal (RFP) provides detailed information and forms necessary to prepare a proposal for Cal OES grant funds. The terms and conditions of this RFP supersede previous RFPs and conflicting provisions stated in the [Subrecipient Handbook \(SRH\)](#).

### **PROGRAM SYNOPSIS**

#### **Program Description:**

The purpose of the LE Program is to create or enhance specialized units to provide a coordinated response to victims of domestic violence and their children. This will be accomplished through investigation of incidents, immediate victim advocacy, training for patrol officers/first responders, and the development of effective protocols and practices that will continue after the Grant Subaward performance cycle has ended.

#### **Eligibility:**

To be eligible to receive funds:

- The Applicant must be a city or county law enforcement department within the State of California, as defined in California Penal Code § 830.1.
- Receive a minimum of 50% of available points to be eligible for funding; however, a minimum score does not guarantee funding.

#### **Grant Subaward Performance Period:**

January 1, 2022 – December 31, 2022

#### **Available Funding:**

Individual Applicants may request up to \$203,143.

#### **Submission Deadline:**

Friday, October 15, 2021

D. ELIGIBILITY

To be eligible to receive funds:

- The Applicant must be a city or county law enforcement department within the State of California, as defined in California Penal Code § 830.1.
- Receive a minimum of 50% of available points on the Rating Sheet.
- Applicants applying for federal funds must be registered in the federal System for Award Management (SAM) and have an expiration date that is at least eight weeks after the Application due date. [Check SAM status](#).

Only one proposal per Applicant will be eligible to receive funding. If an Applicant submits more than one proposal, only the highest scoring proposal, meeting the criteria above, will be considered for funding.

E. GRANT SUBAWARD PERFORMANCE PERIOD

The Grant Subaward performance period is January 1, 2022 – December 31, 2022. Successful Subrecipients will be eligible for a non-competitive reapplication for three consecutive years, contingent upon availability of funds.

F. FUNDS

There is \$1,422,000 available for the Program for the Grant Subaward performance period. **Funding is contingent upon availability of funds and passage of the 2021-22 State Budget Act.**

1. Source of Funds

[Guide](#). Applicants are **strongly encouraged** to review this document to familiarize themselves with the requirements for all fund sources that support this Program.

The Program is supported through the Services\*Training\*Officers\*Prosecutors (STOP) Violence Against Women Formula Grant Program.

- Promotes the development and the implementation of effective, victim-centered law enforcement, prosecution, and court strategies to address violent crimes against women and the development and enhancement of victim services in cases involving violent crimes against women.
- Requires a cash or in-kind match equal to 25 percent of the total project cost. Tribes and victim service providers are exempt.
- Cal OES's four-digit code for this federal fund is STOP. This code will be in the drop-down on the Grant Subaward Face Sheet (Cal OES Form 2-101).

## 2. Funding Amount

Applicants may apply for up to \$203,143 for the 12-month Grant Subaward performance period.

## G. PROGRAM INFORMATION

### 1. Program Description

The purpose of the LE Program is to create or enhance specialized units to provide a coordinated response to victims of domestic violence and their children. The specialized units will accomplish this through investigation, immediate victim advocacy, training for first responders, and the development of effective protocols and practices that will continue after the Grant Subaward performance cycle has ended.

## 2. Program Components

### a. Victim Advocacy

The Subrecipient must contract with a local Cal OES-funded Domestic Violence Assistance (DV) Program Subrecipient for at least one full-time equivalent (FTE) Domestic Violence Counselor, pursuant to Evidence Code §1037.1(a)(1).

The Domestic Violence Counselor must:

- Provide immediate in-person response to requests for victim advocacy services by the Subrecipient on a 24-hour basis;
- Provide consultation, resource materials, and outreach materials to the Subrecipient for first responders and other relevant department personnel;
- Assist with the development and/or revision of officer and advocate protocols for responding to victims of domestic violence and their children; and
- Assist with training of first responders, and other relevant department personnel, on best practices in responding to victims of domestic violence and their children.

### b. Investigation and Coordination

The Subrecipient must fund, or commit to the specialized unit, at least one full-time investigator for a minimum of one year. Investigators assigned to the specialized unit must possess, at a minimum, an intermediate Commission on Peace Officer Standards and Training certificate and have received specialized training beyond the academy level, related to the investigation of domestic violence crimes, in accordance with Penal Code Sections §13516-13519 *et al.*

This position will act in both an investigative and coordinating capacity. The investigator must:

- Evaluate arrest and preliminary investigation reports and provide supplemental reports for cases requiring further investigation within 48 hours of the arrest;
- Gather and document evidence including: witness statements, the identities of all children in the home, previous incidents of domestic violence and violent crimes, and civil

- restraining order information from the California Law Enforcement Telecommunication System;
- Provide or facilitate training for first responders on best practices in responding to victims of domestic violence and their children;
- Assist with the development of protocols for ensuring consistent and appropriate response by first responders to violations of protective orders to ensure victim safety;
- Oversee the completion of domestic violence case follow-up requests or evidence requests from the District Attorney's Office;
- Provide consultation and resources on effective domestic violence intervention and response techniques for first responders, and other relevant personnel employed by the Subrecipient; and
- Work in close cooperation with victim advocacy personnel.

c. Training

The Subrecipient should make every effort to provide online, or in-person training to as many patrol officers/first responders, and other relevant department personnel, on effective domestic violence intervention and response techniques, including, but not limited to:

- The dynamics of power and control in the cycle of violence for victims of domestic violence and their children;
- Understanding the concept of the dominant aggressor;
- Crime scene investigation;
- Conducting thorough victim interviews with detailed accounts of the crime;
- Treating the physical space as a crime scene and diligently documenting, collecting, and booking physical evidence that corroborates the victim's accounts;
- Photographing victim injuries;
- Noting detail on reports to document when children are present and/or are witnesses to the crime;
- Taping victim interviews/statements whenever possible;
- Writing detail-specific and comprehensive crime reports that can be effectively used in: prosecution, court hearings, civil restraining order cases, child protection and custody hearings and conservatorships;

- Completing medical release and confidentiality information; and
- Addressing first responder safety.

d. Protocols for Sustainable Response

The Subrecipient must develop and/or enhance protocols with the contracted Cal OES-funded DV Program Subrecipient for collaborative response to victims of domestic violence and their children. At a minimum, these protocols must include:

- The responsibilities of first responders, addressing how and when to contact the Domestic Violence Counselor;
- The roles and responsibilities of the Domestic Violence Counselor in addressing the needs of victims as well as the needs and concerns of first responders;
- A clearly enforceable method of interagency accountability to address concerns and conflicts raised by either the law enforcement agency or the domestic violence service provider; and
- A long-term plan for sustaining an effective domestic violence response unit after the Grant Subaward performance cycle has expired.

e. Co-location

The Subrecipient must provide a reasonable workspace for the Domestic Violence Counselor contracted through this Program.

f. Operational Agreements (OAs)/Second-Tier Subawards

Subrecipients are required to enter into either Operational Agreements (OAs) or Second-Tier Subawards with the following agencies:

- All Cal OES-funded RC Program Subrecipient(s) within their jurisdiction;
- All Cal OES-funded Domestic Violence (DV) Program Subrecipient(s) within their jurisdiction; and
- The Cal OES-funded Victim Witness Assistance (VW) Program Subrecipient(s) within their jurisdiction.

An OA is a formal agreement, without the exchange of money, between an implementing agency and one or more participating agencies (SRH Section 7.005). A Second Tier Subaward is a formal agreement that includes the exchange of money between an implementing agency and a participating agency to further the goals of the Grant Subaward (SRH Section 7.010).

g. Assistance with California Victim Compensation Board Claims

Subrecipients are strongly encouraged to assist victims with applying for compensation benefits through the California Victim Compensation Board. Activities may include:

- Advising of the availability of such benefits;
- Assisting with application forms and understanding procedures;
- Obtaining necessary documentation to support the claim; and
- Monitoring claim status.

Subrecipients are also strongly encouraged to allocate funds for tablets or mobile communication devices and cellular service to swiftly facilitate the on-line application process in the office or in the field.

3. Reporting Requirements

Progress Reports serve as a record for the implementation of the Grant Subaward. Statistics for Progress Reports must be collected on a quarterly basis, even when reporting occurs less frequently. The following reports are required:

a. Cal OES Progress Reports

There are two Progress Reports required for the Program. See the chart below for report periods and due dates.

b. Office on Violence Against Women (OVW) Report

Subrecipients receiving STOP Violence Against Women Formula Grant Program funds must complete the Annual Progress Report for the STOP Violence Against Women Formula Grant Program. This report covers the calendar year period of January 1 through December 31. This report is due to Cal OES no later than January 31, 2023.

- A. SUBRECIPIENT HANDBOOK

Applicants are strongly encouraged to review the [Subrecipient Handbook \(SRH\)](#). The SRH outlines the terms and conditions that apply to Cal OES VS Branch Grant Subawards and provides helpful information for developing a proposal, including a Glossary of Terms.

- B. COPIES OF THE PROPOSAL

One original and three copies of the proposal must be submitted, per the submission options outlined on page 1. Copies must be assembled separately and individually fastened in the upper left corner. Do not bind the proposal.

- C. FORMS

The Applicant must use the forms provided on our website. The forms must be printed on plain white 8½" x 11" paper and single sided. **Applicants may not alter the formatting of any forms, including the Grant Subaward Programmatic Narrative (Cal OES Form 2-108) and the Grant Subaward Budget Narrative (Cal OES Form 2-107). No tables, charts, or changes to the margins are allowed.**

- D. SPACE LIMITATIONS

If a space limitation is specified under the Programmatic Narrative section, strict adherence to the space limitation is required. **Information included beyond the space limitation and/or unrequested attachments will not be considered in the rating process.** Failure to comply with the spacing/formatting requirements, including **font size and margins**, is one

factor that may negatively impact the Applicant's comprehensive assessment score.

E. PROPOSAL COMPONENTS

Applicants must complete and submit all required forms. All forms have written instructions. General information regarding each form is below. The Checklist in Part V is included to ensure Applicants submit all required components.

1. Proposal Cover Sheet

The sheet identifies the Program for which the Applicant is submitting a proposal.

2. Grant Subaward Face Sheet (Cal OES Form 2-101)

This form is the title page of the Grant Subaward that is signed by the Official Designee (*SRH Section 3.030*) and the Cal OES Director (or designee).

3. Grant Subaward Contact Information (Cal OES Form 2-102)

This form provides Cal OES with contact information for all relevant Subrecipient personnel. Information for each individual should be direct contact information.

4. Grant Subaward Signature Authorization (Cal OES Form 2-103)

This form provides Cal OES with signatures of authorized signers and who they authorize to sign on their behalf for all Grant Subaward-related matters.

5. Grant Subaward Certification of Assurance of Compliance (Cal OES Form 2-104g)

This form is a binding affirmation that the Subrecipient will comply with the following regulations and restrictions:

- State and federal civil rights laws;
- Drug Free Workplace Act of 1990;
- California Environmental Quality Act;

- Federal grant fund requirements;
- Lobbying restrictions;
- Debarment and Suspension requirements; and
- Proof of Authority documentation from the city council/governing board.

Subrecipients may be asked to sign and submit an updated Grant Subaward Certification of Assurance of Compliance (Cal OES Form 2-104g) once in Grant Subaward. Every year, Cal OES updates each Grant Subaward Certificate of Assurance of Compliance (Cal OES Form 2-104g) to ensure that any new conditions placed upon the federal award are passed down to Subrecipients. Subrecipients will be notified if this change is needed.

6. Grant Subaward Budget Pages (Cal OES Form 2-106a)

This form demonstrates how the Applicant will implement the proposed plan with the funds available through this Program. This is the basis for management, fiscal review, and audit. **Grant Subaward Budget Pages (Cal OES Form 2-106a) are subject to Cal OES modifications and approval.** Failure of the Applicant to include required items does not eliminate responsibility to comply with those requirements during the implementation of the Grant Subaward.

7. The Grant Subaward Budget Pages (Cal OES Form 2-106a) automatically calculate the subtotal at the end of each budget category and provide the total of the three spreadsheets at the bottom of the Equipment Costs page. Applicants may add additional columns to the Grant Subaward Budget Pages (Cal OES Form 2-106a) when necessary.

Cal OES requires the Applicant to develop a line-item budget that includes a **calculation and justification in the left column for all expenses.**

The Budget Pages should:

- Cover the entire Grant Subaward performance period;
- Include costs related to the objectives and activities of the Grant Subaward;
- Strict adherence to required and prohibited expenses; and
- Include costs in the correct category (i.e., Personnel Costs, Operating Costs, and Equipment Costs – see below).

Include **only** those items covered by Grant Subaward funds, including match funds, when applicable. Applicants may supplement Grant Subaward funds with funds from other sources. However, since approved line items are subject to audit, Applicants should not include matching funds (if applicable) in excess of the required match on the Grant Subaward Budget Pages (Cal OES Form 2-106a).

a. Personnel Costs – Salaries/Employee Benefits

1) Salaries

Personnel includes Grant Subaward services performed by Grant Subaward staff **directly employed by the Applicant** (not a contract or Participating Agency) and must be identified by position, cost and time spent on allowable activities for the Grant Subaward (e.g., Clerical Staff @ \$20/hour x 980 hours; or Victim Advocate @ \$1,500/month x 12 months x .50 FTE). Personnel may be salaried or hourly, full-time or part-time positions. Sick leave, vacation, holidays, overtime, and shift differentials must also be budgeted as a part of salaries. If the Applicant's personnel have accrued sick leave or vacation time prior to the approval of the Grant Subaward, they may not take time off using Grant Subaward funds.

2) Benefits

Employee benefits must be identified by type and percentage of salaries. The Applicant may use fixed percentages of salaries to calculate benefits. Allocated benefits cannot exceed those already established by the Applicant.

Employer contributions or expenses for social security, employee life and health insurance plans, unemployment insurance, and/or pension plans are allowable. Benefits, such as uniforms or California Bar Association dues, are allowable budget items if negotiated as a part of an employee benefit package.

A line item is required for each different position/classification, but not for each individual employee. If several people will be employed full-time or part-time in the same

position/classification, provide the number of full-time equivalents (e.g., three half-time clerical personnel should be itemized as 1.5 clerical positions).

Additional information on Personnel Expenses can be found in *SRH Part 3*.

b. Operating Costs

Operating costs are defined as necessary expenditures other than personnel salaries, benefits, and equipment. The costs must be Grant Subaward-related (i.e., to further the Program objectives as defined in the Grant Subaward) and be encumbered during the Grant Subaward performance period.

Examples of common operating costs include, but are not limited to:

- Audit costs (*SRH Section 14.035*);
- Computers with an acquisition cost of \$4,999 or less;
- Computer equipment rentals;
- Consultant services (*SRH Section 6.050*);
- Equipment service and maintenance agreements;
- Financial Assistance for clients (*SRH Section 4.040*);
- Furniture and office equipment with an acquisition cost of \$4,999 or less;
- Indirect costs (*SRH Section 4.045*);
- Insurance (e.g., vehicle, fire, bonding, theft, malpractice, and liability);
- Internet access;
- Office supplies;
- Office rental space (*SRH Section 4.055*);
- Postage;
- Printing;
- Second-Tier Subawards (*SRH Section 7.010*);
- Software;
- Training materials;
- Travel and per diem (*SRH Section 4.065*);
- Utilities; and
- Vehicle maintenance.

Additional information on Operating Expenses can be found in *SRH Part 4*.

c. Equipment Costs

Equipment is defined as nonexpendable tangible personal property having a useful life of more than one year and a cost of \$5,000 or more per unit (excluding tax).

A line item is required for different types of equipment, but not for each specific piece of equipment (e.g., three copy machines must be one line item, not three).

Additional information on Equipment Costs can be found in *SRH Part 5*.

8. Grant Subaward Budget Narrative (Cal OES Form 2-107) – Maximum Three Pages

The Budget Narrative should describe the following:

- a. How the proposed budget supports the objectives and activities.
- b. How funds are allocated to minimize administrative costs and support direct services.
- c. How shared costs are allocated.
- d. How Grant Subaward-funded staff duties and time commitments support the proposed objectives and activities.
- e. The necessity for subcontracts and unusual costs.
- f. Need for mid-year salary range adjustments.

9. Grant Subaward Programmatic Narrative (Cal OES Form 2-108)

This form is the main body of information describing the problem to be addressed, the plan to address the identified problem through appropriate and achievable objectives and activities, and the ability of the Applicant to implement the proposed plan.

a. Problem Statement – Maximum Four Pages

In narrative form, address the following:

- 1) Describe the department's history of involvement and collaboration with domestic violence service providers in the department's jurisdiction.
- 2) Describe the need for expansion of collaborative efforts with domestic violence service providers in the department's jurisdiction.
- 3) Describe the need for a more effectively coordinated response to domestic violence victims in the department's jurisdiction.
- 4) Describe the absence of, or improvement needed, regarding advocacy for victims of domestic violence and their children in the department's jurisdiction.
- 5) Describe the need for revised, expanded, or development of protocols for ensuring a consistent and appropriate response by officers to violations of protective orders to ensure victim safety in ongoing cases.
- 6) Describe the need for additional domestic violence-specific training for patrol officers/first responders and other relevant department personnel.
- 7) Describe the need for mechanisms of interagency accountability between the agency and the contracted DV Program service provider.

b. Plan – Maximum Four Pages

In narrative form, address the following:

- 1) The plan for meeting the core components (as listed in Part I, section G, 2, of the RFP) of the LE Program.
- 2) The plan for contracting with a DV Program service provider for a Domestic Violence Counselor position.

- 3) The plan for utilizing the Domestic Violence Counselor (identified in Part I, section G, 2, a, of the RFP) for the purpose of immediate response to victims and their children.
- 4) The plan for providing domestic violence-specific training (as identified in Part I, section G, 2, c, of the RFP) to patrol officers and other relevant department personnel.
- 5) The plan to institute mechanisms of interagency accountability between the agency and the contracted DV Program service provider.
- 6) The plan to develop and implement protocols for ensuring consistent and appropriate response by officers to violations of protective orders to ensure victim safety.
- 7) The plan for developing and/or enhancing protocols for responding to victims of domestic violence and their children that will remain sustainable after the Grant Subaward performance cycle has ended.

c. Capabilities – Maximum Three Pages

In narrative form, address the following:

- 1) Describe the Applicant's experience at effectively training patrol officers/first responders and other relevant department personnel.
- 2) Describe the qualifications and/or educational levels necessary for the job assignment of the officer(s) that will be assigned to the specialized unit and articulate how those qualifications/education levels meet the requirements (identified in Part I, section G, 2, b).
- 3) Describe the Applicant's experience working with victim service providers in the community.

#### 10. Subrecipient Grants Management Assessment

Per title 2 CFR § 200.331, Cal OES is required to evaluate the risk of noncompliance with federal statutes, regulations, and terms and conditions posed by each Subrecipient of pass-through funding. The

assessment is made to determine and provide an appropriate level of technical assistance, training, and oversight to Subrecipients.

#### 11. Grant Subaward Service Area Information (Cal OES Form 2-154)

This form identifies the counties, cities, and congressional districts served by the Grant Subaward.

#### 12. Organizational Chart

The Organizational Chart should clearly depict the structure of the Applicant organization and the specific unit within the organization responsible for the implementation of the Grant Subaward. This chart should also depict supporting units within the organization (e.g., the Accounting Unit) and the lines of authority within the organization. Job titles on the Organizational Chart must match those in the Grant Subaward Budget Pages (Cal OES Form 2-106a) and Grant Subaward Budget Narrative (Cal OES Form 2-107).

#### 13. Additional Forms/Documents

The following are required only if applicable:

- Operational Agreements Summary Form (Cal OES Form 2-160)

This form lists the OAs a Subrecipient has with participating agencies/organizations. OAs are required per Part I, section G of this RFP.

- Non-Competitive Procurement Request (Cal OES Form 2-156)  
This form is required only if the Applicant proposes a line item on their Grant Subaward Budget Pages (Cal OES Form 2-106a) that meets the criteria for a Non-Competitive Procurement Request per *SRH Section 6.045*.

- Independent Contractor/Consultant Rate Exemption Request (Cal OES Form 2-164)

This form is required only if the Applicant is requesting an exemption to the maximum rate for an independent contractor/consultant of \$650 per eight-hour day or \$81.25 per hour per *SRH Section 6.050*.

- Out-of-State Travel Request (Cal OES Form 2-158)

This form is required only if the Applicant proposes a line item for out-of-state travel per *SRH Section 4.065*.

- Lodging Rate Exemption Request (Cal OES Form 2-165)

This form is required only if an Applicant is requesting approval for an exemption to lodging costs per *SRH Section 4.065*.

- Payee Data Record

This form is required only if the Applicant has never before received a Grant Subaward from Cal OES's VS Branch.

### A. SELECTION OF PROPOSAL FOR FUNDING

#### 1. Proposal Rating

Eligible proposals received by the deadline are generally evaluated by a three member team. The rater scores are averaged and then ranked numerically. Proposals are only evaluated numerically; no notes are taken during the evaluation. The Rating Sheet used for this process is included in Part IV of this RFP and is for informational purposes only.

#### 2. Funding Decision

Final funding decisions are made by the Director of Cal OES. Funding decisions are based on the following:

- The ranked score of the proposal;
- Consideration of priorities or geographical distribution specific to this RFP; and
- Prior negative administrative and programmatic performance, if applicable.

Subrecipients previously funded by Cal OES will be reviewed for poor past compliance, including fiscal management, progress and annual reports, audit reports, and other relevant documentation or information. This review may result in one or more of the following actions:

- The Subrecipient may not be selected for funding;
- The amount of funding may be reduced; and
- Grant Subaward Conditions may be placed on the Grant Subaward.

#### 3. Notification Process

The Official Designee (who signed Grant Subaward Face Sheet) will be notified in writing, via electronic communication, of the results of the

rating process. Applicants not selected for funding will receive a denial letter containing their average score and information on the appeal process.

Cal OES can only respond to technical questions about the RFP during the period of time between the publication date and completion of the RFP process. Requests for records must be made through a Public Records Act request at [PRA@caloes.ca.gov](mailto:PRA@caloes.ca.gov).

The Grant Subaward Programmatic Narrative (Cal OES Form 2-108), Grant Subaward Budget Narrative (Cal OES Form 2-107), and Budget Pages (Cal OES Form 2-106a) for the top-ranked proposal may be posted on the Cal OES website.

## B. FINALIZING THE GRANT SUBAWARD

### 1. Grant Subaward Application

Once selected for funding, Cal OES may require additional documentation to finalize the Grant Subaward Application package. The Program Specialist identified in your Award Letter can provide technical assistance in completing these components.

### 2. Grant Subaward

A copy of the executed Grant Subaward and pertinent attachments will be sent to the Grant Subaward Director. The Applicant is not authorized to incur costs against the grant until a copy of the fully executed Grant Subaward is received. When the executed Grant Subaward is received, a Report of Expenditures and Request for Funds (Cal OES Form 2-201) may be submitted for reimbursement.

#### a. Grant Subaward Conditions

Cal OES may add Grant Subaward Conditions to the Grant Subaward prior to or after funding. If conditions are added, these will be discussed with the Subrecipient and a copy of the conditions will be sent to the Subrecipient when the conditions are made part of the Grant Subaward.

b. Grant Subaward Amounts

When the amount of funds available is limited, Cal OES may reduce the amount of the Grant Subaward from the amount requested by the Applicant. In addition, Cal OES reserves the right to negotiate budgetary changes with the Applicant prior to executing the Grant Subaward. If either of these actions is required, Cal OES will notify the Applicant prior to executing the Grant Subaward.

3. Standard Grant Subaward Funding Authority

**Allocation of funds is contingent on the enactment of the State Budget.**

Cal OES does not have the authority to disburse funds until the Budget is passed and the Grant Subaward is fully executed. Expenditures incurred prior to authorization are made at the Subrecipient's own risk and may be disallowed. Cal OES employees are not able to authorize an Applicant to incur expenses or financial obligations prior to the execution of a Grant Subaward. However, once the Grant Subaward is finalized the Subrecipient may claim reimbursement for expenses incurred on, or subsequent to, the start of the Grant Subaward performance period.

If, during the term of the Grant Subaward, the state and/or federal funds appropriated for the purposes of the Grant Subaward are reduced or eliminated by the California Legislature or the United States Government, or in the event revenues are not collected at the level appropriated, Cal OES may immediately terminate or reduce the Grant Subaward by written notice to the Subrecipient.

Cal OES Grant Subawards are subject to applicable restrictions, limitations, or conditions enacted by the California Legislature and/or the United States Government, subsequent to the execution of the Grant Subaward.

- IV. ABOVE AVERAGE:** The response is above average and provides a clear and detailed understanding of the Applicant's intent. The response presents a persuasive argument that supports the proposal and the intent of the Program.
- V. EXCELLENT:** The response is outstanding, with clear, detailed, and relevant information. The response presents a compelling argument that supports the proposal and the intent of the Program.
