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EXECUTIVE SUMMARY

INTRODUCTION

The California Governor’s Office of Emergency Services (Cal OES), Office of Grants Management, Victim Services (VS) Branch presents the annual fiscal and programmatic status report to the Joint Legislative Budget Committee for fiscal year (FY) 2021-22. This report provides the Legislature, our stakeholders, and Subrecipients with a comprehensive understanding of the work being accomplished across California through our programs. This report lists each of the VS Branch’s programs, Grant Subawards, fund sources, funded amounts, budget program/components, and the resulting statistics gathered for FY 2021-22 (July 1, 2021, to June 30, 2022) for each VS Branch program.

In FY 2021-22, the VS Branch administered approximately \$453 million in funding, including much needed COVID-19 funding, through programs that respond to victims’ needs or promote an effective criminal justice system response to victims. The following pages provide a snapshot of the activities, allocations, and statistical data related to the nearly 90 victim services and criminal justice grant programs administered by Cal OES’s VS Branch. Below are Program Highlights that are included to showcase the outstanding efforts of state, local, and community-based victim services and criminal justice organizations that Cal OES’s VS Branch funds. The funding allows for prevention, intervention, and enforcement components that work toward achieving a safer California. The need for these services is on-going – without continued state and federal grant funding, many of these exemplary projects would cease to exist.

PROGRAM HIGHLIGHTS

AMERICAN RESCUE PLAN UNIT

The Sacramento Regional Family Justice Center (SRFJC) serves victims of domestic violence, elder abuse, human trafficking, sexual assault, and child abuse and is a Subrecipient of the Domestic Violence Rescue Plan (RP) Program. The purpose of the RP Program is to ensure the continuity of domestic violence services and/or response to COVID-19 for non-shelter supportive

services and/or prevention activities. SRFJC was able to increase the number of case managers to assist victims with services and support the need to move from a place of danger and trauma to one of safety and hope. Case managers listen to victims' stories and assist with a variety of services based on their unique situations, including but not limited to: crisis intervention, counseling, danger and lethally assessment, and court accompaniment during restraining order hearings. Victims also have access to SRFJC community partners including WEAVE, My Sisters House, Sacramento County District Attorney's Office, Lao Community Development, International Rescue Committee, and SAFE (Special Assault Forensic Evaluation) Center.

Case Study:

A young mother with four children came to the SRFJC, with nothing but her purse, as she fled her home after a violent abusive incident with her husband. She wanted to get a restraining order, but it was late and the beginning of a three-day holiday weekend. SRFJC contacted the local domestic violence agency who provided safe shelter for her and her children until she could come back to the SRFJC on Tuesday morning to file a restraining order.

On Tuesday, one of SRFJC attorneys worked with her to file the temporary restraining order while a counselor created a safety plan for her and her children and offered continuing counseling and support. Child Protective Services helped with resources she did not know were available to her. They were able to get into transitional housing where they could stay until she could get a permanent restraining order. SRFJC staff worked with her during that interim time to help her better understand the cycle of violence and helped her get in contact with her family who were unaware of her circumstances. The staff also helped prepare her for the court hearing and provided court accompaniment.

SRFJC is proud to report that this client and her children are safe, in permanent housing now and living a healthy, productive life.

CHILDREN'S UNIT

The Regents of the University of California, Davis CAARE Center provides patient care, teaching, research, and prevention initiatives for children and youth identified as high-risk of abuse and neglect and is a Subrecipient of the Child Abuse Treatment (AT) Program. The AT Program provides funding for comprehensive psychotherapy services to children victimized by abuse and/or neglect. Psychotherapy services for family members and/or caregivers of child victims are also available to help with the treatment of the child.

Case Study:

A 12-year-old female was referred to the Regents of the University of California,

Davis CAARE Center due to a history of sexual abuse by multiple perpetrators, exposure to parental substance abuse, and neglect. The child was removed from her mother's care at age 10 and placed with her biological father who she had not had a relationship with since age five. Engagement and building trust took extended time due to her complex trauma history and being placed in a home with a father, stepmother, and younger male half-siblings she did not know. The child's parents had a hard time understanding how her trauma affected her ability to trust and build relationships with them. The child's primary therapist focused on the child's trauma and a separate therapist provided collateral trauma-focused cognitive behavioral therapy (TF-CBT) sessions to the parents. After a year, the child was able to complete TF-CBT culminating in a successful sharing of her trauma experience. The parents made significant progress in understanding how the child's trauma affected her brain development. They began to see her strengths, be more responsive to her emotional needs, and provide more consistent validating interactions that increased her sense of security in the home.

LAW ENFORCEMENT & COUNTY VICTIM SERVICES UNIT

The Sacramento Internet Crimes Against Children (ICAC) Task Force focused efforts on promoting the Northern California Regional Training Center's (NCRTC) Forensic, Internet Crimes and Wellness Training to 112 affiliated agencies. NCRTC hosted multiple forensic and ICAC trainings, providing 107 affiliated agency investigators advanced training, this in turn reduced the caseloads within the Task Force. The two-day Introduction to Hi-Tech Crime Training, was revitalized providing an introduction to digital evidence investigations to over 68 students.

NCRTC hosted two Supporting Heroes in Mental Health Foundational Trainings (SHIFT), promoting officer wellness to 51 investigators. SHIFT training provides tools and resources to cope with the negative effects the investigations can take on from the exposure to child sexual abuse materials in the workplace.

Case Study:

A cybertip from the National Center for Missing and Exploited Children led to a perpetrator that was uploading and downloading child pornography. A search warrant was written for the perpetrator's Google accounts. While viewing the entirety of one of the videos in the perpetrator's possession, a child was seen wearing a t-shirt from a local middle school. Detectives went to the middle school where the student in the video was identified. Detectives authored a search warrant and served him the same day. The perpetrator was detained and Mirandized. He admitted to sexually abusing the child and filming the incidents. Other videos were found depicting the perpetrator and the juvenile neighbor in various states of sexual activity. The perpetrator was arrested on multiple counts of sexual abuse of a child and possession and manufacturing

child pornography. The US Attorney's Office prosecuted the case.

According to court documents, the perpetrator sexually abused a 13-year-old victim, producing multiple visual depictions of those acts. The perpetrator sent at least one video recording of the victim to another person over the internet in exchange for different files depicting children. On the date of the arrest, over 200 videos depicting the sexual abuse of children, some as young as toddlers, were found on the perpetrator's iPhone.

The perpetrator was sentenced on January 6, 2022, to 24 years and four months in prison, to be followed by 20 years of supervised release, for sexual exploitation of a child.

DOMESTIC VIOLENCE UNIT

The Domestic Violence Unit has continued to expand and develop current programs through state & federal funds. The development of these programs will continue to create and support programs that provide multifaceted prevention and intervention efforts to support victims of Domestic Violence as they rebuild their lives. In particular, Cal OES has implemented the Gun Violence Restraining Order Outreach (GO) Program to facilitate education and training efforts related to gun violence restraining orders (GVRO) and how to petition for one through an outreach campaign tailored to domestic violence victims, including those most marginalized.

Cal OES has selected the California Partnership to End Domestic Violence (CPEDV) to design and implement a public education campaign to drive public awareness regarding GVROs and the petition process. This will include the development of a website, digital/social media advertisement, and digital and physical GVRO pamphlets for distribution to domestic violence groups. Additionally, CPEDV will distribute awarded funds to other community-based domestic violence organizations to conduct outreach to domestic violence victims within the community they serve and ensure marginalized communities are reached.

HOUSING UNIT

'Jenna' is a transitional youth who fled her home because her parents were being emotionally abusive. They did not approve of her transgender identity. When she left to stay at a motel, the parents cut financial ties and Jenna was unable to afford the motel any longer. She did not even have a car to stay in. This is when she found WISEPlace where she received shelter, nutritious meals, and case management support. WISEPlace collected her documentation and helped provide her with a transition age youth emergency housing voucher. During her time at WISEPlace, she obtained employment and received

transportation assistance to help her get to her job. WISEPlace also assisted her with her search for housing and aided her in applying to a nearby unit. She moved to a 1-bedroom apartment where WISEPlace supplied her with basic housewares so she could feel at home. Jenna continues to receive supportive services through a partner housing organization and WISEPlace checks in regularly to see how she is doing.

HUMAN TRAFFICKING & LEGAL ASSISTANCE UNIT

Last year the Coalition to Abolish Slavery & Trafficking (CAST) served 1,625 survivors of human trafficking and their family members, took over 2,000 hotline calls, and trained over 14,000 professionals on how to identify and respond to human trafficking. CAST also took the opportunity to share their expertise on the realities of human trafficking: how it happens, to whom, what CAST is doing, and what more needs to be done. Additionally, they focus on three issues that make people particularly vulnerable to human trafficking: homelessness, criminalization, and poor health and wellbeing.

SEXUAL ASSAULT UNIT

To address the significant impact of COVID-19 on sexual assault service programs, 103 Subrecipients funded through the Rape Crisis (RC) Program, Campus Sexual Assault (CT) Program, and the Victim Advocacy in Detention Facilities (KA) Program were augmented funds through the Family Violence Prevention and Services Act (FVPSA) American Rescue Plan (ARP) COVID-19 Rape Crisis Centers and Sexual Assault Programs (FVSA) Supplemental Funding Program. The purpose of these funds is to assist with the transition to virtual/remote services for rape crisis centers, sexual assault programs, tribal programs, and culturally specific programs that provided crisis services, support services, and assistance to survivors of sexual assault and support the increased emergency needs of sexual assault survivors as a result of the COVID-19 public health emergency.

Specifically, these funds helped to prepare for, prevent, and respond to COVID-19. Funding supported a range of in-scope activities including counseling, mobile advocacy, telehealth, teletherapy, peer support, temporary housing, rental assistance and nominal relocation expenses, supplies, equipment, and software to assist in carrying out virtual services.

UNDERSERVED VICTIMS UNIT

The Underserved Victims Unit continues to fund victim assistance service programs to various underserved populations throughout California. One of those programs is the Innovative Response to Marginalized Victims (KI) Program, which supports innovative projects and serves marginalized victims of crime and provides many various services to victims of poly-victimization. The KI Program

focuses on providing direct services to young males of color, victims of gang violence, refugees, low wage workers (janitorial, service industry, etc.), transgender, and foster care youth.

The case study below highlights the efforts provided to promote coordinated public/private community efforts within the KI Program to assist Native American victims with sexual assault victimization.

Client contacted law enforcement requesting assistance with getting off a tribal reservation and to a local Y.W.C.A. women's shelter. The client was homeless and met a male companion and was living in a tent in a nearby town. The male companion physically assaulted her, and the client reported the attack to the county sheriff's office. After this assault, the client met another male companion, and she provided housecleaning services at his home. Shortly after the client ended up living with this person in exchange for continual housework and meal preparation services. Eventually the exchange for housework services led to sexual intercourse. A couple of months later, the client became pregnant, and after four months was ready to leave. The client stated she didn't want to have intercourse but felt it was her only option from being homeless. The client realized shortly that she was being pimped out by overhearing a conversation about collecting money for having intercourse with the client. The client confronted the perpetrator and he threatened to take her back to the town where she was seen as "Indian Gold" as a Caucasian girl on the reservation where she would experience being raped by Indian men and/or killed by Indian women. The client was able to get away and received prenatal care at Sutter Hospital. The client divulged to the nurse about being the victim of sexual abuse and prostitution. The client ended up moving and is currently receiving support and referral services from VOICES in Santa Rosa to overcome her victimizations.

VICTIM WITNESS & PROSECUTION UNIT

The City of San Diego, District Attorney's Office is a Subrecipient of the Gun Violence Restraining Order (GS) Program. The GS Program supports statewide gun violence restraining order training.

The San Diego City Attorney's Office (San Diego CAO) is recognized as a state and national leader in protecting the public through the use of Gun Violence Restraining Orders (GVROs). GVROs are a life-saving tool created by California's "red flag" laws to proactively prevent predictable acts of gun violence before a tragedy occurs. The San Diego CAO, in partnership and collaboration with the San Diego Police Department, launched its program in December 2017. Since then, more than 1,700 firearms have been removed in the City of San Diego from individuals who threatened violence against co-workers, classmates, intimate partners, family members, the general public, and/or themselves. The GVROs have also been utilized to prevent mass casualty events, and as a "gap-

filler” for pending criminal investigations, criminal cases, and situations where firearms have not been seized pursuant to another type of restraining order.

Helping other agencies to utilize the life-saving mechanism of the GVRO is a high priority for the San Diego CAO office. Since July 2021, the San Diego CAO, through the implementation of the GS Grant Subaward, has trained over 65 agencies, including law enforcement and those providing law enforcement legal representation throughout California. The agencies trained include county and federal partners. As the laws and best-practices evolve, many jurisdictions have received multiple trainings. Additionally, attorneys from the San Diego CAO routinely offer technical assistance to the agencies they have trained as they implement their own GVRO programs. Attorneys at the San Diego CAO receive an average of five to ten queries per week from different jurisdictions regarding how to handle GVROs. Grant funding has facilitated these trainings, and the additional support they provide.

1. Victims of Crime Act (VOCA) Victim Assistance Formula Grant Program (Formula Grant Program)

The VOCA Formula Grant Program is authorized by the Victims of Crime Act of 1984 (34 U.S.C. § 20103 (a) and (b)).

VOCA authorizes federal financial assistance to states through the VOCA Formula Grant Program for the purpose of supporting eligible crime victim assistance programs that: 1) respond to the emotional and physical needs of victims of crime; 2) help primary and secondary victims of crime to stabilize their lives after a victimization; 3) help victims of crime understand and participate in the criminal justice system; and 4) provide victims of crime with a measure of safety and security. Crime victim is defined as any person who has suffered physical, sexual, financial, or emotional harm as a result of the commission of a crime.

2. Services*Training*Officers* Prosecutors (STOP) Violence Against Women (VAW) Formula Grant Program

The STOP VAW Formula Grant Program was authorized in 1994 through the Violence Against Women Act (VAWA). VAWA, Public Law 103-322 was reauthorized in 2000, 2005 and most recently in 2013. The STOP Formula Grant Program is administered by the Office on Violence Against Women, Office of Justice Programs, U.S. Department of Justice.

The STOP Formula Grant Program promotes the development and the implementation of effective, victim-centered law enforcement, prosecution, and court strategies to address violent crimes against women and the development and enhancement of victim services in cases involving violent crimes against women. States and communities are encouraged to restructure and strengthen the criminal justice system response to domestic violence, sexual assault, and stalking, drawing upon the experience of all participants in the system.

3. The Family Violence Prevention and Services/Domestic Violence Shelter and Supportive Services (FVPS) Grant

The FVPS Grant is authorized by 42 U.S.C. § 10401, Family Violence Prevention and Services Act.

The Family Violence Prevention and Services/Domestic Violence Shelter and Supportive Services grant, administered through the Administration on Children, Youth and Families' (ACYF) Family and Youth Services Bureau (FYSB), is designed to assist states in their efforts to support the establishment, maintenance, and expansion of programs and projects to:

1) prevent incidents of family violence, domestic violence, and dating violence; 2) provide immediate shelter, supportive services, and access to community-based programs for victims of family violence, domestic violence, or dating violence, and their dependents; and 3) provide specialized services for children exposed to family violence, domestic violence, or dating violence including victims who are members of underserved populations (45 CFR § 1370.10(a)).

4. Children's Justice Act (CJA) Grants to States Program

The CJA Grants to State Program is authorized by Section 107(a) of the Child Abuse Prevention and Treatment Act (P.L. 111-320).

The purpose of the CJA Grant is to assist States in developing, establishing and operating programs designed to improve: (1) the assessment and investigation of suspected child abuse and neglect cases, including cases of suspected child sexual abuse and exploitation, in a manner that limits additional trauma to the child and the child's family; (2) the assessment and investigation of cases of suspected child abuse-related fatalities and suspected child neglect-related fatalities; (3) the investigation and prosecution of cases of child abuse and neglect, including child sexual abuse and exploitation; and (4) the assessment and investigation of cases involving children with disabilities or serious health-related problems who are suspected victims of child abuse or neglect.

5. Sexual Assault Services Formula Program (SASP)-specific to the RC Program

The Sexual Assault Services Formula Program (SASP) is authorized by 34 U.S.C. §12511. SASP was created by the Violence Against Women and Department of Justice Reauthorization Act of 2005, as amended by the technical amendments to that act, and is the first federal funding stream solely dedicated to the provision of direct intervention and related assistance for victims of sexual assault.

The SASP Formula Program directs grant dollars to states and territories to assist them in supporting rape crisis centers and other nonprofit, nongovernmental organizations or tribal programs that provide core services, direct intervention, and related assistance to victims of sexual assault. Rape crisis centers and other nonprofit and tribal organizations, such as dual programs providing both sexual violence and domestic violence intervention services, play a vital role in assisting sexual assault victims through the healing process, as well as assisting victims through the medical, criminal justice, and social support systems. Funds provided through the SASP Formula Program are designed to supplement other funding sources directed at addressing sexual assault at the state and territorial level.

6. State General Fund (SGF)

The California State Budget Act authorizes funding, in statute, each fiscal year to specific programs. These programs support services for victims including, but not limited to, housing for homeless youth, legal resources and information, family violence prevention, and training and technical assistance.

7. State Penalty Fund (SPF)

The State Penalty Fund was created as a depository for assessments on specified fines, penalties, and forfeitures imposed and collected by the courts for criminal offenses and used to support victim services programs, amongst others. These State funds can be used for match requirements following the provisions of the *Subrecipient Handbook*, Section 6522.

PROGRAM SUMMARIES

The purpose of the Best Practice Initial Child Interview Video Training (VQ) Program is to educate first responders on how to properly conduct a forensically-sound, trauma-informed victim interview during an initial child sexual abuse investigation to ensure successful prosecution.

This is accomplished through the creation of three training videos: a Commission on Peace Officer Standards and Training certified video for law enforcement; a video specific to Child Protective Services personnel; and one for the broader category of first responder-mandated reporters. These training videos are to be made available statewide.

Northwest Professional Consortium Research, Inc. compiled information through interviews with Subrecipients who received funding through the eSCARS Program. The information was used to create and finalize the eSCARS Guidance Document that can be used by counties throughout California as a reference tool when developing their own eSCARS. The Guidance Document includes the steps necessary to develop eSCARS, building on lessons learned by the counties who had already developed their own, including how to: convene key partners and build support for eSCARS; determine the approach to building eSCARS; obtain child welfare data; build and test the system; plan system roll out and train staff; implement eSCARS; and ensure sustainability.

Northwest Professional Consortium Research, Inc. reviewed CJA-funded training programs and provided evaluation support and consultation for the development of knowledge tests, satisfaction questions, and follow up surveys.

Northwest Professional Consortium Research, Inc. assisted with a new CJA-funded program by developing an evaluation plan and surveys so the effectiveness of the program has measurable outcomes.

The purpose of the Child Advocacy Center (KC) Program is for Child Advocacy Centers (CACs) to provide direct victim services to child abuse survivors and their families through a multidisciplinary team approach. These services must include victim-centered, trauma-informed forensic interviews, advocacy, direct or referral to therapy/counseling, and referrals for medical exams.

California Penal Code §11166.4 states “each county may use a children’s advocacy center to implement a coordinated multidisciplinary response, pursuant to Section 18961.7 of the Welfare and Institutions Code, to investigate reports involving child physical or sexual abuse, exploitation, or maltreatment. A county that utilizes a CAC to coordinate its multidisciplinary team shall require the CAC to meet standards pursuant to California Penal Code §11166.4, part b.” Required components of the KC Program include, but are not limited to: a multidisciplinary team consisting of law enforcement, child protection, prosecution, mental health, medical, and victim advocacy professionals who work together to help children heal from abuse; a dedicated child-focused setting designed to provide a safe, comfortable, neutral place where forensic interviews and other CAC services may be provided for children and families; resource and referral services, and case review and tracking.

The purpose of the Child Sexual Abuse Training and Technical Assistance (NC/SC) Program is to provide training and technical assistance to service providers who work directly with child sexual abuse victims or who handle child sexual abuse cases.

Pursuant to the requirements of Welfare and Institutions code §18275, the NC/SC Program funds training centers, one in Northern California (Northern Child Sexual Abuse and Technical Assistance Center) and one in Southern California (Southern Child Sexual Abuse and Technical Assistance Center). The training centers are responsible for developing training programs for interagency teams of service providers throughout California, including law enforcement, social services, health care providers, and mental health providers. Service providers who receive the training will then provide training in their communities.

Required components of the NC/SC Program include: providing training on sexual abuse issues; providing up to four Child Forensic Interview Training classes; providing training topics that cover the issues and needs of child sexual abuse victims with disabilities; ensuring training is culturally and linguistically competent; providing course certification to meet licensing and/or continuing education needs of the attending professionals; and using training assessments that evaluate the trainers and the effectiveness of the training curriculum.

The purpose of the Court Appointed Special Advocates (KS) Program is to fund Court Appointed Special Advocate (CASA) Programs in California in order to provide more children in foster care with a CASA volunteer.

CASAs are trained community volunteers appointed by juvenile court judges to advocate for children who are placed into the protective custody of the child welfare system due to abuse or neglect. CASAs review court facts and documents pertaining to the child’s case and submit formal reports to the judge at every scheduled hearing/review. The CASA monitors the child’s case to assure that the judicial and child welfare systems are moving ahead to secure a safe, permanent home for the child, and that court-ordered services are provided to the child.

Required components of the KS Program include: recruiting volunteers in order to increase the number of children who receive advocacy services from a CASA volunteer; training CASA volunteers pursuant to the Welfare & Institutions Code Sections 102(d) and 103(a); and providing oversight, support, and supervision to CASA volunteers.

The KS Program is supported with the following funds: State General Funds (SGF) – Victims of Crime Act Supplemental (VCGF) and federal Victims of Crime Act Victim Assistance Formula Grant Program (VOCA).

The purpose of the Domestic Violence Housing First (XD) Program is to provide victims of domestic violence with safe, permanent housing and ongoing supportive services tailored to address the individual needs of each victim.

The XD Program is designed after the Housing First Model, as defined in Welfare and Institutions (W&I) Code Section 8255 to address the prevalence of homelessness in California. The Housing First Model is an approach to connect individuals and families experiencing homelessness quickly and successfully to permanent housing without preconditions and barriers to entry, such as sobriety, treatment, or service participation requirements.

Required components of the XD Program include, but are not limited to: housing assistance; financial assistance; and supportive services for victims. Organizations that receive XD Program funding must also hire one full-time equivalent advocate, who has met the requirements of a “Domestic Violence Counselor” as described in Evidence Code §1037.1(a)(1) as well as one half-time equivalent advocate in the role of Housing Coordinator.

The XD Program is supported with the following funds: State General Funds (SGF) – Victims of Crime Act Supplemental (VCGF), federal Family Violence Prevention Act (FVPA), and Federal Victims of Crime Act Victim Assistance Formula Grant Program (VOCA).

The purpose of the Human Trafficking Victim Assistance (HV) Program is to help human trafficking victims recover from the trauma they experienced and assist with reintegration into society through the provision of comprehensive safety and supportive services using a trauma-informed, victim-centered approach.

Required components of the HV Program include, but are not limited to: access to a 24-hour crisis hotline for victims; emergency shelter and temporary housing assistance; emergency food and clothing; and counseling. Organizations that receive funding through the HV Program must also ensure staff working with human trafficking victims qualify as Human Trafficking Caseworkers as described in Evidence Code §1038.2 and are trained according to the minimum requirements therein.

Since fiscal year 2019-20, many HV Program Subrecipients shifted focus to better identify and serve victims of labor trafficking as well as sex trafficking. Examples have included additional training for victim service advocates and partner organizations (such as hospital/health clinic staff), co-locating human trafficking caseworkers in hospitals, clinics, and family justice centers, and the development of local multi-disciplinary teams with expertise in addressing the needs of labor trafficking victims. Beginning in fiscal year 2020-21, HV Program Subrecipients have worked to integrate remote access to their services, such as through text and mobile apps, to preserve accessibility to services for victims impacted by stay-at-home orders issued due to COVID-19.

The Improving Outcomes for Child and Youth Victims of Human Trafficking (IO) Program brings together the Alameda County District Attorney's Office (ACDAO), Cal OES, and the California Department of Social Services to improve outcomes for child and youth victims of human trafficking.

The goals of the IO Program included: engaging in detailed planning with a multidisciplinary team of state leaders and stakeholders; developing and conducting a comprehensive multiday, multidisciplinary training to identify best practices and improve coordinated local responses; and evaluating existing and new program models to determine the impact of outcomes for child and youth victims of human trafficking, and identifying effective strategies.

The IO Program was supported with funds through the federal Improving Outcomes for Child & Youth Victims of Human Trafficking Program (IOCV). Funds were allocated in FY 2017-18. This was a one-time funded program that ended August 31, 2021.

The IO Program is not a direct services program, rather, the goals and objectives focused on supporting regional and statewide strategies for collaboration and coordination of services to improve outcomes for child and youth victims of human trafficking. Activities for the IO Program included:

- Developing evaluation and data collection instruments (through subcontractor WestEd) to support third party evaluation of services and supports implemented by the Improving Outcomes for Transition Age Youth Victims of Human Trafficking Pilot (IP) Program Subrecipients;
- Providing technical assistance through capacity-building meetings (through subcontractor WestEd) to the IP Program Subrecipients. During this period, WestEd provided 37 technical assistance sessions to IP Program Subrecipients;
- Planning and logistical coordination for the first of two collaborative learning exchanges between the IP Program Subrecipients (through subcontractor

WestEd). The first, which focused on establishing and working with multi-disciplinary teams, occurred in August 2020 via video/teleconference due to COVID-19 pandemic restrictions. The second focused on client services, occurred in March 2021, again, via video/teleconference; and

- Planning and hosting the comprehensive, multiday, multidisciplinary training, which occurred June 7–8, 2021. ACDAO gathered a diverse group of participants for the virtual Multi-day Conference. The forum of speakers represented a spectrum of knowledge and experience in Combatting Human Trafficking. Speakers for the event included representatives throughout the State from district attorney's offices, victim witness, probation, tribes, service providers, and most inspiringly, people with lived experience. The conference provided an opportunity for conversation and considerations, as well as a call to action, for expansion of the commission and task forces in California. Speakers gave presentations on topics relevant to human trafficking in their communities and disciplines, and then led conversations in breakout rooms. The IP Program Subrecipients presented on their experience with the implementation of their programs and lessons learned.

Personnel – Prevention Staff

This reporting period is establishing the first year of the FD Program and captured initial data and recap of the statistical outcomes in narrative form. Subrecipients encountered very few delays in the hiring/retention of prevention staff as identified in the FD Grant Subaward. Data was consistent that there were no delays due to high turnover, insufficient salary, insufficient benefits, or heavy workload issues. If staff shortages or delays were mentioned the common theme was relating to COVID-19.

Project Implementation

The reported data from all nine FD Program Subrecipients suggest that there were minimal issues with project implementation. Each project implementation plan outlined their marginalized population of focus, development of prevention curriculum and its dissemination, and numerous prevention events that were conducted and numbered in the hundreds across the State.

Many aspects of the focused populations' center around vulnerable immigrant youth and their families, high risk youth, youth engaged in the foster care system, unhoused youth, and youth involved with the justice system. Targeting these marginalized groups with prevention strategies towards teen dating violence and other intimate partner violence by teaching healthy relationship skills to prevent sexual violence, domestic violence, and teen dating violence and promote social norms that protect against violence. Other offerings centered on self-care and empowerment for this audience as well. The dissemination of information and implementation of strategies to this audience are mostly through outreach efforts with local school districts and other education-based community groups and planned community events.

The Housing First Model is an approach to connect individuals and families experiencing homelessness quickly and successfully to permanent housing without preconditions and barriers to entry, such as sobriety, treatment, or service participation requirements.

Required components of the XH Program include, but are not limited to: transitional/short-term housing assistance; community engagement; and supportive services. Organizations that receive XH Program funding must also hire a one half-time equivalent advocate in the role of Housing Coordinator.

The XH Program is supported with the following funds: State General Funds (SGF) – Victims of Crime Act Supplemental (VCGF), and federal Victims of Crime Act Victim Assistance Formula Grant Program (VOCA).

TRAUMA INFORMED CARE & BRAIN SCIENCE PRINCIPLES TRAINING PROGRAM | 2023

The purpose of the Trauma Informed Care & Brain Science Principles Training (TQ) Program was to provide comprehensive web-based training on trauma-informed approaches and brain science principles to various professional disciplines that handle child abuse cases or work with children who have been traumatized by abuse. The training is focused on reducing trauma to victims of child abuse and their families.

Training covered the effects of trauma on children, how children's brains are affected by trauma, and how to effectively work with children who have experienced trauma. The training included innovative trauma-informed approaches, nationally-recognized studies on trauma and brain science, examples and case studies specific to each training audience, practical tools to mitigate stress and increase resilience, and cultural competency.

The TQ Program was supported with funds through the federal Children's Justice Act Grants to States Program (CJA0).

VICTIM ADVOCACY IN DETENTION FACILITIES PROGRAM | 2023

The purpose of the Victim Advocacy in Detention Facilities (KA) Program is to increase access to appropriate services for victims of sexual assault in local detention facilities, including adult detention facilities, juvenile detention facilities, and immigration detention facilities.

This is accomplished by funding a Sexual Assault Counselor, per Evidence Code §1035.2, to focus solely on serving victims in detention facilities and acting as the point of contact to assist in eliminating physical or programmatic barriers. Required components of the KA Program include: collaborating with detention facilities; assisting with California Victim Compensation Board Claims; providing direct services; and participating in the Sexual Assault Team meetings.

The KA Program is supported with the following funds: State General Funds (SGF) – Victims of Crime Act Supplemental (VCGF), federal Victims of Crime Act Victim Assistance Formula Grant Program (VOCA), and Family Violence Prevention Services and American Rescue Plan (FVSA).

The purpose of the Victim Information and Notification Everyday (VN) Program is to track the location of inmates while incarcerated and inform victims of changes to incarceration location and/or release.

The VN Program, also known as VINE, supports the National Victim Notification Network services providing access to timely and reliable information about criminal cases and the custody status of offenders, 24-hours per day. This is accomplished by providing crime victims with VINE tracking service access; recording direct services; providing services regardless of immigration status; and providing free notification services. Victims and other concerned citizens can register by phone, email, text message, or TTY device to be notified whenever an offender’s custody status changes. The system communicates with jail and prison booking systems in near real-time by transmitting updated information to the Appriss Data Network, which manages the automated interfaces and monitors offender status. VINE utilizes a free downloadable app via cellphone, laptop, or computer. When a change in the custody status of an offender occurs, county jails and state prison facilities transmit information through Appriss, which then immediately notifies registered crime victims of the offender’s new status.

The VN Program is supported with the following funds: State General Funds (SGF) – Victims of Crime Act Supplemental (VCGF), State Penalty Fund (SPF) – Victim-Witness Assistance (VWAO), State General Funds (SGF) – Victim Information and Notification Everyday (VINE), and federal Victims of Crime Act Victim Assistance Formula Grant Program (VOCA).

The purpose of the Victim Witness Assistance (VW) Program is to maintain Victim Witness Assistance Centers (Centers), in each of California's 58 counties, to provide comprehensive services to victims and witnesses of all types of violent crime, pursuant to California Penal Code §13835.

The required components of the VW Program include, but are not limited to:

- Crisis intervention;
- Emergency assistance;
- Orientation to the criminal justice system;
- Court escort;
- Case status/disposition;
- Victim compensation claims assistance;
- Direct counseling; property return;
- Notification of family, friends, and employers;
- Resource and referral assistance;
- Restitution assistance (upon request of the victim);
- Outreach;
- Public presentations; and
- Training for criminal justice agencies.

Centers are located in district attorney's offices, probation departments, county sheriff's offices, and non-governmental organizations. The VW Program also provides for a mass victimization advocate (MVA) position to develop and implement a victim assistance plan to support and enhance immediate response and recovery efforts and establish readiness in response to criminal mass victimization/terrorism incidents.

The purpose of the Victims Legal Resource Center (VR) Program is to provide victims, their families, and victim service providers with information about victims' legal rights in the criminal and civil justice systems, as well as tailored resource referrals.

The VR Program was established through the passage of Assembly Bill 1176 and codified as California Penal Codes §13897-13897.3. The intent of the legislation was to ensure that crime victims receive much needed information regarding legal issues. Required components of the VR Program include, but are not limited to: expanded hours of operation of the California Victim Resource Center to increase access to legal information, referral, and resources; providing callers with information about victims' legal rights to compensation; providing service providers with information regarding the legal rights of victims of crime; advising callers about potential civil causes of action and references to local legal aid and lawyer referral services; advising and assisting callers in understanding and implementing their rights to participate in sentencing and parole eligibility hearings; advising callers about victims' rights in the criminal system, assisting them in overcoming problems, assisting with the return of property, and informing them of procedures that protect witnesses; referring callers to local programs which include victim-witness programs, rape crisis units, domestic violence programs, and child sexual abuse centers; and referring callers to local resources for information about public and private benefits and the means of obtaining aid.

The required components of the VV Program include vertical prosecution, when a prosecutor and a victim advocate are assigned to a case from the initial filing of charges through the penalty phase; victim advocacy; only highly qualified staff are assigned to the vertical prosecution unit; and staff must attend regularly scheduled multidisciplinary meetings in the project service area that pertains to the crime type(s) selected for vertical prosecution. Vertical prosecution has shown to improve conviction rates, reduce victim trauma, and provide more consistent and appropriate sentencing.

The purpose of the Youth Emergency Telephone Referral Network (YT) Program is to provide a non-threatening, toll-free hotline to connect youth in need of services to appropriate service agencies. The referral can be accessed by youth and their families from anywhere in the State.

Hotline counselors assist callers via the phone line, text, or online chat. They counsel callers and connect them to appropriate service providers, providing a warm hand-off and terminating participation in the call once a connection has been made. The hotline can also be used as a message center for parents, guardians, and/or youth who wish to communicate with each other but do not want to speak directly.

The YT Program is supported with the following funds: State General Funds (SGF) – Youth Emergency Telephone Referral (YET0), State General Funds (SGF) – Victims of Crime Act Supplemental (VCGF), and federal Victims of Crime Act Victim Assistance Formula Grant Program (VOCA).
