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Q. STATE INVESTMENTS IN HAZARD MITIGATION AND CLIMATE ADAPTATION

The State of California invests in hazard mitigation and climate adaptation through various State grant programs across a variety of partner agencies. This appendix summarizes recent spending through key programs.

Q.1. GREENHOUSE GASE REDUCTION FUND

Through the Greenhouse Gas Reduction Fund (GGRF), California has appropriated \$19.6 billion toward the State's climate goals and implemented \$11.4 billion in projects as of August 2022. These investments support programs and projects that reduce greenhouse gas (GHG) emissions in the State and deliver major economic, environmental, and public health benefits for Californians, including meaningful benefits to the most disadvantaged communities. The fund supports programs and projects within three priority areas: transportation and sustainable communities, clean energy and energy efficiency, and natural resource and waste diversion. The fund received continuous appropriations and annual appropriations through the Legislature's yearly budget deliberations.
