# RSF QUICK START

Guidance for the Development of County/Municipal Recovery Support Functions

July 2024



#### Introduction

Recovery from a natural disaster is a process that can span decades and requires a coordinated approach by visionary leaders representing all aspects and interests of a community. Communities with a pre-disaster recovery framework and established disaster working groups are better positioned to immediately implement recovery initiatives and projects after a disaster.

Recovery Support Functions (RSFs) are the coordinating structure for disaster recovery working groups established by the Federal Emergency Management Agency (FEMA) and the California Governor's Office of Emergency Services (Cal OES). The attached pages were designed to jumpstart a county/municipal RSF structure that aligns with the state and federal structures. Each county/municipal RSF should have a designated coordinating agency that will lead the group and report to the jurisdiction's executive offices and elected officials.

The best time to design a recovery structure is before your community experiences a disaster.

#### How to use this information

The following RSF sheets were designed to provide a starting place for assembling RSF teams within municipalities and counties. It is important to note that while the guidance follows the six RSF structure established by state and federal emergency management agencies, jurisdictions are NOT required to follow the six RSF format; RSFs may be added or removed based on the unique conditions of the community.

Each RSF sheet contains a list of suggested members, training, and resources. The Members list encompasses city, county, and regional partners that may provide valuable input, guidance, or support to an RSF working group. This list is a starting point only; each jurisdiction should consider the unique government, nonprofit, private sector, and special interest organizations that represent their community when designing RSF working groups. County executive offices, Boards of Supervisors, and public information offices appear on each list to signify the need for executive and legislative leadership, as well as public engagement.

The Training list includes relevant online training that will orient the working group members to the RSF responsibilities and the role of that RSF within the overall emergency management structure. The Resources list includes guides, websites, and references about topics related to that RSF.
