GLOSSARY OF TERMS

Term	Definition
<u>Administrative Orders (AO)</u>	Agreements between Cal OES and state agencies and/or departments that have preparedness, response, recovery, and/or mitigation capabilities and resources. The AO is developed by each agency/department and supports the functions outlined in the California State Emergency Plan.
<u>California Disaster Recovery Framework (CDRF)</u>	Modeled after the <u>National Disaster Recovery Framework (NDRF)</u> , the CDRF is intended to guide and coordinate recovery efforts after significant disasters or emergencies and includes resources and disaster recovery program information.
<u>California Emergency Support Functions (CA-ESFs)</u>	Each CA-ESF is led by a state agency or department and consists of an alliance of other state agencies, departments, and stakeholders with similar responsibilities. The CA-ESFs support implementation of the California State Emergency Plan.
<u>California Recovery Support Functions (CA-RSFs)</u>	Each CA-RSF is led by a state agency or department and consists of an alliance of other state agencies, departments, and stakeholders with similar responsibilities. The CA-RSFs are modelled after the <u>federal RSFs</u> and support implementation of the California Disaster Recovery Framework. The CA-RSFs include Community Planning and Capacity Building, Economic, Health and Social Services, Infrastructure Systems, and Natural and Cultural Resources. Economic RSF Coordinating Agencies: <ul style="list-style-type: none"> • <u>California Office of Small Business Advocate</u> (state) • <u>United States Economic Development Agency</u> (federal)
<u>Comprehensive Economic Development Strategy (CEDS)</u>	A CEDS contributes to effective economic development in communities and regions through a place-based, regionally driven economic development planning process.
<u>Federal Disaster Declaration</u>	A disaster declaration (emergency or major disaster) may be issued by the President if a disaster occurs that overwhelms the combined capabilities of state and local governments to response. A declaration may activate FEMA Public Assistance (PA) for public entities, FEMA Individual Assistance (IA) for



	individuals, households, and businesses, or both. Federal Disaster Declarations are compiled HERE .
Joint Field Office (JFO)	A JFO serves as a unified command center where representatives from various agencies, including state, federal, and sometimes non-governmental organizations, come together to manage resources, communicate priorities, and streamline assistance efforts for disaster impacted communities.
Small Business Administration (SBA) Disaster Declaration	An SBA Disaster Declaration is issued by the SBA Administrator and may or may not be in response to a Federal Disaster Declaration. This declaration activates low-interest physical damage and/or economic injury disaster loans to businesses, homeowners, renters, and/or private nonprofit organizations. SBA Disaster Declarations are compiled HERE .
State Emergency Plan (SEP)	A comprehensive plan that provides an overview of how the state prepares for, mitigates, responds to, and recovers from emergencies in California. The plan is a requirement of the California Emergency Services Act (ESA).
