Overview

The California Governor's Office of Emergency Services (Cal OES), Interagency Recovery Coordination is comprised of six Recovery Support Functions (RSF) teams. The teams are Community Planning & Capacity Building (CPCB), Natural & Cultural Resources (NCR), Health & Social Services (HSS), Economic (ECON), Housing (HSG), and Infrastructure Systems (INF). The role of the RSF teams is to help communities with long-term recovery after disasters strike.

The 2020 Wildfire season is the largest on record. By the end of the year, over 9,900 fires burned 4,397,809 acres of land in California. Roughly 4 percent of the state's 100 million acres. The wildfires crossed over 20 counties, destroying 10,488 buildings. Statistically, the 2020 wildfire season is the most catastrophic on record.

Wildfire survivors and any other disaster survivors are all trauma survivors. The effects of surviving wildfires or any other type of disaster are considered traumatic affects. For communities impacted disasters behavioral health rises among top concerns for the health and wellness of the entire community. Though Federal Disaster programs include Immediate and Regular Crises Counseling Programs, CCP, many survivors continue to be at risk for behavioral health impacts following the sunset of those programs, or perhaps need additional support outside of those programs.

Substance Abuse and Mental Health Services, SAMHSA, research shows that one third of disaster impacted survivors experience a post incident behavioral health disorder. At risk indicators such as suicide Ideation, plans, and attempts occur much later following a disaster. Patricia Watson, a psychologist at the National Center for Post-Traumatic Stress Disorder, writes in "[A Mental Health Crisis is Burning Across the American West](#)", that among wildfires survivors, 10 to 30 percent will develop a diagnosable behavioral health condition such as post-traumatic stress disorder or depression, as well as domestic violence, substance abuse, or both.

Psychological First Aid for Schools (PFA-S)

Resource Description	<p>Developed by the National Child Traumatic Stress Network (NCTSN) and the National Center for PTSD, Psychological First Aid for Schools (PFA-S) is “an evidence-informed intervention model to assist students, families, school personnel, and school partners in the immediate aftermath of an emergency” (NCTSN & National Center for PTSD, 2009).</p> <p>PFA-S is an adaptation of Psychological First Aid (PFA), a modular approach for assisting survivors in the immediate aftermath of natural and human-caused disasters. PFA-S can be delivered by school personnel with or without mental health training as well as by mental health professionals. The model comprises eight core actions, including contact and engagement, safety and comfort, and connection with social supports.</p>

Traumatic Stress Intervention (CFTSI)

Resource Description	Aimed at preventing PTSD, Traumatic Stress Intervention (CFTSI) focuses on two key risk factors: poor social or familial support, and poor coping skills in the aftermath of traumatic events. It seeks to reduce these risks by increasing communication between the affected child and his or her caregivers about feelings, symptoms, and behaviors, and by teaching specific behavioral skills to the caregiver and child to enhance their ability to cope with traumatic stress reactions.

Skills for Psychological Recovery (SPR)

Resource Description	<p>Skills for Psychological Recovery (SPR) is intended to be used after PFA, in the weeks and months after a disaster. SPR is intended to help survivors identify their most pressing current needs and concerns and teach and support them as they develop skills to address those needs.</p> <p>Each SPR skill can be covered in one contact session and reinforced in continuing contact sessions. Although each contact can stand alone, ideally the survivor will participate in multiple contacts and continue to learn and practice the skills with support from the SPR provider. The actions all include task assignments to practice the skills learned.</p>
