## **Recovery Spotlight**

Lessons in Paradise



Paradise, which lost 90% of it's buildings in the 2018 Camp Fire, has now become California's fastest grown city as it rebuilds from the wildfire. The community has grown from less than 5,000 residents in 2020 to an estimated 12,000 today. Paradise has implemented major safety improvements including 21 early warning sirens, evacuation zones, removal of 200,000 fire damaged trees, and undergrounding 90% of power lines to reduce future wildfire risk. ### **HOUSING LEGISLATION New Rules for California's FAIR Plan**

AB234 is headed to the governor after reports of smoke-damage claim problems and a big jump in FAIR plan policies. The bill would increase oversight and require more transparency from the FAIR plan.

### Housing Bill Allows Taller Buildings Near Transit



Lawmakers proposed SB79, which allows neighborhoods around train, light rail, and subway stations allowing developers to build residential buildings up to 75 feet tall regardless of local zoning or opposition. The bill applies only to eight counties with at least 15 passenger rail stations. The legislation requires developers to set aside 7% of homes for lower-income residents, replace any destroyed rent-controlled units, and in some cases hire unionized construction workers. The bill aims to increase housing and boost transit use.
