

## **Funding Opportunities**

## California Department of Fish and Wildlife:

- Oil Spill Response Equipment Grant Program awards grants to any local government entity for pre-position response equipment to protect economic and environmental resources in the event of an oil spill.
- California Native American Preparedness Grant Program
  provides funding to Native American tribes for Hazardous Waste
  Operations and Emergency Response training, participation in oil
  spill exercises, attendance at oil spill-related meetings, and
  involvement in outreach events.

## **UC Davis School of Veterinary Medicine:**

Oiled Wildlife Care Network (OWCN) offers two competitive grant programs: Pre-proposal for full research projects, and the Small Grant Proposal for pilot or smaller research projects. The goal is to fund projects related to improving animal capture and care methods and technologies, and assessing wildlife health and welfare to inform prevention, capture, care, and release of oiled wildlife.

<u>CDFW's Office of Spill Prevention and Response (OSPR)</u> mission is to provide best achievable protection of California's natural resources by ensuring key players in the oil supply chain have properly planned for, exercised, and identified response resources and have demonstrated the financial ability to pay for oil spills.

The <u>Oil Spill Task Force</u> is an organization of representatives from state and provincial environmental agencies in the Pacific coastal area working to deepen partnerships to prevent, prepare for, respond to, and recover from oil spills.

The <u>Oiled Wildlife Care Network (OWCN)</u> is a statewide collective of trained wildlife care providers, regulatory agencies, academic institutions, and wildlife organizations working to rescue and rehabilitate oiled wildlife in California.
