## WHAT IS VEGETATION MANAGEMENT?




Vegetation management reduces wildfire risk and manages resources by clearing brush, thinning forests, and creating defensible spaces around structures.

- Cal Fire Vegetation Management Program (VMP): Focuses on the use of prescribed fire for tackling wildland fire fuel hazards. This method mimics natural processes, restores fire to its historical role in wildland ecosystems, and provides fire hazard reduction benefits to enhance public and firefighter safety.
- The California Vegetation Treatment Program (CalVTP): Uses prescribed burning, mechanical treatments, herbicide, and prescribed herbivory as tools to reduce hazardous vegetation in the Wildland-Urban Interface (WUI), to construct fuel breaks, and to promote ecological restoration, all while providing tool compliant to the California Environmental Quality Act (CEQA).
- <u>Caltrans Integrated Vegetation Management Plan (IVP)</u>: Utilizes herbicide, mowing, weed whacking, hand removal, and prescribed herbivory to control vegetation along the state highways for the safety of motorists and cyclists and to prevent wildfires.

#### What residents can do:

- <u>California Wildfire and Forest Resilience Task Force</u>: A collaborative effort to align the activities of federal, state, local, public, private and tribal organizations to support programs and projects tailored to the unique priorities and risks of each region. # FUNDING OPPORTUNITIES



## Department of Forestry and Fire Protection

• <u>California Forest Improvement Program</u>: A cost-share program to encourage private and public investment in, and improved management of, California forest lands and resources. The focus is to ensure adequate high quality timber supplies, related employment and other economic benefits, and the protection, maintenance, and enhancement of a productive and stable forest resource system for the benefit of present and future generations.

## Rivers & Mountains Conservancy

• <u>Wildfire Prevention Grant Program</u>: Preventative measures to increase fire-resilience and prevention, improve forest health, restore burned areas, and stimulate workforce development.

#### California FireSafe Council

• <u>2025 State Fire Capacity Grant Program</u>: To support hazardous fuels reduction, community wildfire prevention planning, and education and mitigation activities across California.

#### Forest Stewardship Program

• The <u>Forest Stewardship Program</u> provides assistance to owners of forest land through management, stewardship, and economic benefits.

### **USDA Farm Service Agency**

• <u>Emergency Forest Restoration Program (EFRP)</u> helps the owners of non-industrial private forests restore forest health damaged by natural disasters by authorizing payments to owners of private forests to restore disaster damaged forests.
